The Redskins have done it again...the clean, hard, and fast winning football of Chief Harry Franks has, for the third straight year, won the Lower Bucks County League Football Championship.

Harry Franks, along with his new line coach, Scout Master John Petercuskie, have fashioned, this year, one of the best high school football squads in the league's long history. This year's Redskins had..... Lightning Speed in its backfield warriors Don Cameron, Joe "Shorty" Moronese, Bill Barrett, Errol Faunce, Ned Moyer, and Dick Wilt, combined with one of the toughest and well-manned Redskin lines including Bob "Wheel" Rothenbach, Stan Covington, Fred Buhner, Bob Hurst, Frank Ferguson, Andy Davies, Paul Swann, Bill Simmers, and Monty Ahlum.

The long, dreary, dark, storm is over for Neshaminy opponents.

Well, the long, dreary, and dark storm has finally passed by leaving many sorrowful memories in the minds of our Redskin opponents. As the clouds pass over the Happy Hunting Grounds of our Lower Bucks County, Chief Harry Franks is watching his Neshaminy Redskins dance with joy over the "good hunting" during the past season.

The determined Neshaminy Redskins struck like sharp and devastating bolts of lightning as seven league foes and three more-impressive area teams hit the dust. It seemed as though the Lightning gained momentum after each successive hit, and struck hardest on Thanksgiving morning against a supposedly good Bensalem team.

First Bolt Stops Muhlenberg Township--18-13

Chief Harry Franks called on his hungry Redskins early in September (the 10th) to stop an attack planned by a well-coached up-state Muhlenberg Township eleven.

Playing the same clean, hard, and fast football, demonstrated by our boys, the Reading Dutchman, wasted little time informing our Redskins, they didn't just come down for the ride. After taking an early 7-0 lead, Muhlenberg was introduced to our touchdown twins, Don Cameron and Joe "Shorty" Moronese. Both of these boys scored successive T.D.'s, but still the Dutchmen lead, 13-12, at halftime.

The rain and mud didn't help things any as both teams played to a standstill during the 3rd quarter.

Joe Steals Ball

Little Joe Moronese turned the tide of battle by picking up a loose ball, and started to run "home" with it. After Shorty was stopped on about the 40, newcomer Errol Faunce put his miracle arm in working order until, close enough to the goal, he powered the ball over for his first score at Neshaminy--we led, 18-13.

The Dutchmen came back determined to enjoy their ride home, but the line charges of John Petercuskie did a remarkable job in stopping

Don Cameron increased his T. D. strength by marking up two more impressive touchdown jaunts. Our ever alert 1953 All-County end, Stan Covington broke into the scoring column by picking up an enemy fumble and galloping eight giant steps in chalking up a 40-yard T. D. Stan scored again later in the game by way of a Faunce T. D. aerial. Joe Moroneso joined in with the celebrating, gaining his second touchdown of the year. Neshaminy 32-12.

Coaches undecided-but, can't complain when we're winning; or can we!

Big War Party--Delhaas goes down.

While the Delhaas Tigers were making their way over to the Playwicki field, planning a sneak attack on our Redskins, Chief Harry Franks and Scout Master John Petercuskic called a special war party for their 38 Lightning Redskins.

As the thousand or more Indians from the Neshaminy Reservation kept beating out the all-out-attack drum beat, Stan, Ned, Little Joe, Errol, Bill, and Monty whooped it up on the playing field by hitting direct targets for six pointers.

Look out for: Ned Moyer, junior wingback, who took over for Neshaminy's Cameron, and nobody knew any difference--not even Delhaas, Ned scored twice during the evening to lead our Redskins in their 47-0 massacre.

One might have thought our line coach, John Petercuskic gave his charges each a tomahawk the way they made the holes and cut the enemy line to pieces. You people are aware (we hope) of Wheel, Hurst, Fred, Fergie, Andy, Paul, Bill, and Dick being in our games, too--they aren't scoring any points, but then, those guys across the line aren't either.

On September 24, our boys took a free ride to the New Jersey school, only to find the game canceled because of a police case within the football team. The second ride, November 19, just six days before Thanksgiving, was destined to be a more profitable one, at least we hoped so.

After having to kick themselves out of trouble within the initial four plays, Pleasantville was befuddled at the odd formation set up by the visiting Redskins. Not only was the formation confusing, but a second play touchdown run for Cameron would have been even, moreover, had it not been called back; Don stepped on sideline, shucks!

Never had the Indians faced such a struggle. Never before did two teams of such equal force match brain and brawn as the New Jersey Greyhounds and the determined Weshaminy Redskins fought tooth and nail to break each other's defense.

Don Cameron must not only be remembered for his many T. D.'s but also for his timely gains and quick thinking. It was with 6 minutes to go in the last period of play that Don broke the game wide open. Attempting to make a run on a routine line play. Don met too much opposition. In an attempt to reverse his field, Don, after throwing off a would-be tackler, spotted, white shirts down field, quick throw the pigskin and--the rest is like it should have been the entire game.

Shorty hauls in pass, scores T. D.-Extra points puts finishing touches. Pleasantville was desperate, but did not impress our linemen, this was our game.

Forgio, normally an offensive guard, who early in the second quarter set up a would-be break, by blocking a Greyhound kick, pulled the same feat, this time turning the break into a typical Joe Moronesi line plunge, 13-0. After four more plays and no gain, the Redskins again take over with a Cameron to Moyer T. D. pass, extra point good, 20-6.

This time things will be different.

All season the new, powerful Neshaminy Lightning had increased its effectiveness. After downing a really good Muhlenberg Township team, then Eddystone, and then six less-impressive L. B. League teams, and finally withstanding the tough outfit from Pleasantville, our Chief Franks'-invented Neshaminy Lightning was so forceful that most people, even Coach Harry Franks, himself, was not aware of his over-all team potentialities.

Yes, the Redskins were aware of last year's 7-6 loss to Bensalem, and when Bob Hurst and all the other Redskins said, "This year things will be different," they realized what they were saying, and what they had to do--and how to do it.

1954 Redskins outmatch and outman 1953 Squad

Our 1954 Redskins have out-performed all other squads that have represented our Neshaminy High School. Not only have they rolled up more points - 349 - but they have done so against stiffer opposition than any other Redskins had faced before. The entire first eleven men plus a few more had "earned, not received" their letters in previous years at Neshaminy. This year's backfield was more versatile than most others, as any of the six men could switch positions and duties as well. The line was well-seasoned from previous years and our reserve strength became very evident

This time things were different.

throughout the campaign. Coach Franks had available for action, no less than twelve "men" who could be relied upon for any assignment.

All of these things, a speedy, high-scoring, versatile backfield, a double-armed, well-informed line, a band of Redskins who haven't forgotten, and two great coaches, who make winning a game the only thing to do, meant, and could only mean a smashing victory over the Bensalem Owls.

Entire Team "Up" For Bensalem Battle

The final victory of the season was definitely a team victory - even though the scoring was limited to Morones, Cameron, and Faunce.

There wasn't a thing wrong with anything our boys did - but then it was planned to be that way. Every time our boys got the ball, the big ferocious Redskins drove the defense clear out of the picture. And every time Bensalem had the ball the "hungry" Redskins got the ball back in Neshaminy hands.

Faunce started the scoring parade with a 34-yard run after the first three plays; Cameron followed with a 54-yard "Statue of Liberty" run; and Joe plunged over from the one, concluding a 47-yard drive.

All of these boys scored again as Joe plunged over for two more, while Cameron made two shorter runs, and Faunce scored his second on a three-yard plunge. The 53 - 6 win over Bensalem was a gallant climax for such a "great gang of REDSKINS" and two really top-notch Coaches.

SALUTE TO A GREAT BUNCH OF REDSKINS

Each year high schools lose a great part of their athletic teams by way of graduation. For many graduating athletes, as well as other students, it becomes difficult at times to say, "you have done your job well."

This year's graduating football players, are, however, quite an exception. Eight of the Redskins have played four years of football under Chief Harry Franks and during these years have lost only twice in 37 games. A most commendable record for a great gang of Indians led by an even greater Chief.

FRESHMAN-1951-JR. HIGH CHAMPIONSHIP

The quiet, confident, soft spoken Harry Franks came to our Neshaminy High School back in the days of the Cherry Street School remember, 1951? Mr. Franks' job that year was to be Jr. High Football coach.

"Most of us hadn't even played football before," said Bob "Wheel" Rothenbach when asked about the Freshman year. So we can see Coach Harry Franks had his hands plenty full with Cameron, Hurst, Stan, Wheel, Shorty, Fred, Wilt, Denny, Moffett, Vinnie, and a few others.

Right from the start Coach Franks stressed the basic fundamentals of winning football—playing clean, hard and fast. Just four years ago, these seniors took their seven game schedule, from Morrisville to Council Rock, in the typical Franks manner—seven wins, no losses and a Jr. High Championship.

"He (Franks) told us to take our shoes along to Bristol," Bob Hurst said, "so that if we'd lose, we had to walk home." And I bet he would have made us, too," added Bob Rothenbach.

Remember Don Cameron and Stan at ends (and how Franks would have to go over and get Stan out of bed to practice football); Dick Wilt at the "T" quarterback, Rothenbach at halfback, Joe Moroneso at full, and Hurst at his usual tackle spot. What beginning! The "Baby" Redskins scored 136 points and only allowed 3 touchdowns to be scored against them during their initial year.

SOPHOMORE-1952-Franks, Head Coach

In his second year at Neshaminy, Coach Harry Franks, only a chieftain a year ago, was made Head Chief of the "not too impressive" Neshaminy Redskins.

The young, but "wise old chief" installed his own system—the single wing—and with approximately 18 men, Franks whipped together a band of hungry Redskins, who broke all previous scoring records, here at our Neshaminy Reservation, or back at the old Playwicki Field.

With only 2 weeks of practice under their belts, chief Franks took his new Redskins to Ambler only to suffer defeat. "We made too many fundamental mistakes," claims Harry, but does give Ambler, the rating of a good team.

The next Saturday night, Sept. 20 over at Pennsbury, was the start of the 18 consecutive winning streak of our terrific Redskins as they stormed their previous coach Jim Egli and the Falcons by a 27-0 score.

In winning the L. B. C. L. Football Championship, the high scoring Redskins of 1952 set a new Lower Bucks scoring record of 278 points, allowing only 78 points to their opposition, and only 14 points to their league opponents.

Remember the days of Al Hofmann, Steve Cloak, Ferman Lex, Gary Latham, Tony Peale, Lou Maurer, Ray Brody, Tom Stahl, Walt Hessler, Nick Grudza, Dave Crowley, together with our 1953 and 1954 Redskins. "This was really a great gang of Football players," says Coach Franks.

Mr. Redskin-Becomes Neshaminy Football Chieftain

It was after the 1952 season that Coach Franks brought to reality an honorary Football Captain in the person of Mr. Redskin. This is especially an honor; since the captain is elected by the players themselves, although Coach Franks does set forth four main qualifications.

Mr. Redskin should be:

1. The best all-around football player.
2. The best all-around citizen.

3. The most cooperative with the players and coaches.
4. Plus Sportsmanship, Conditioning, and General Attitude for the good of the team.

1952 Mr. Redskin was Steve Cloak while Neshaminy claimed Lower Bucks County's best lineman and best back awards of that year in Al Hofmann and Lou Maurer respectively. These three players, Cloak, Maurer, and Hofmann, together with Ferman Lex, Gary Latham, and Tom Heather were named to the 1952 All-County team.

Everything went fine all year, until our Thanksgiving game with the Bensalem Owls, and this game not only broke our 18 game winning streak but forced us into a tie for the L. B. County Football Title.

That game, Bensalem, was going to be revenged no matter what the cost. The cost was hard work, plenty of practice, the thought of having to go hungry another Thanksgiving dinner. Just one year later, 1954, it seemed as though our angry Redskins didn't even know that such a name as Bensalem existed.

For the 1953 season, our Mr. Redskin was likeable Tom Buckley, our most reliable quarterback. Don Cameron, high scorer, was named the best backfield man in the county while Ken Kauffman, Stan Covington, and Tom Lauther joined ace Donny Cameron on the 1953 All-County team.
