

# Cameron, Moronese Shine In 57-13 Win; Lost Five TDs On Penalties, Bobbles

Don Cameron and Joe Moronese, two senior backs who like to run with a football, scored 45 points between them Saturday night as Neshaminy walloped Bristol, 57-13, on the loser's field.

The Redskins scored at will though there never was a real sustained drive. Long runs, accurate passing and a fast-charging line highlighted the attack.

Though Neshaminy did cross the Bristol goal on nine official occasions, the squad still was not at its peak performance. The Redskins' inability to hold onto the elusive pigskin was all that prevented the score from going into astronomical figures. At various times throughout the game at least three touchdown passes were dropped and on two occasions TDs were called back because of penalties.

The Neshaminy forward wall, which is best by far in the conference, played its usual sterling game. The scores made by the Warriors were purely the responsibility of the backfield. Bristol picked up the majority of its first downs against the second and third string lines.

Neshaminy's backfield ran off with the laurels in this contest. Fleet-footed Cameron and the "spark plug" Moronese ran wild. Cameron, who was held to a gain of a few yards in last year's Bristol fracas, certainly got sweet revenge as he rolled up to four TDs. Moronese, who is battling Arvie Powell of Morrisville for the league's individual scoring honors, put a few Warrior feathers in his bonnet by garnering three touchdowns and booting three extra points. Ends Monty Ahlum and Stan Covington accounted for the other two six-pointers.

It was practically all Cameron in the first period. On a punt re-

turn last year's unanimous choice for All-County back caught the ball on the Neshaminy 46-yard line and raced 54 yards to pay dirt. Following an intercepted pass by Covington, Cameron took advantage of a good hole in the Bristol line to outrun the secondary on a 29-yard jaunt for his second TD within minutes of the opening whistle.

Then Moronese took over. From the Bristol 44, on a wedge, he raced through the center of the Warriors' forward wall, dodged in and out of the secondary and was finally downed by VanWright on the one-yard line. Joe then scored on a plunge.

Cameron and Moronese continued their torrid pace in the second period. Don went off tackle for 31 yards to the Bristol 34. "Shorty" not to be outdone shot over the same tackle position on the very next play and was not tripped up until he hit the end zone. Minutes before the end of the first half Moronese, the area's leading scorer, plunged over center for the Redskins' fifth TD of the half. Moronese made his first conversion after four misses.

The second half play was dominated by the junior varsity squad, though the first-string backfield did play the majority of time in the third stanza. Neshaminy went on to make two scores in this period, one on a 54-yard pass play from Faunce to Ahlum and a 23-yard aerial from Faunce to Cameron.

In the last quarter with the score reading 43-6, the Redskins added two more tallies. The lone score was made in the first half for the Warriors when VanWright fell on a Redskin fumble in the end zone. Covington and Cameron topped off the festivities when each pulled in a touchdown pass from the right arm of Errol Faunce.

The outstanding players for Bristol were left halfback Alfred Caucci and left guard Tom Corrigan. Caucci was the workhorse, both running and receiving passes. Corrigan was the top performer in Bristol's forward wall crashing in quite consistently. It was he more than anyone else who gave Moronese trouble on the extra-point kicking.
