the REDSKINS take the gridiron for the eleventh and final time this evening in a battle between champions -Neshaminy Section I and Bensalem Section II.

The Owls of Bensalem bring a six wins, one loss (the opening game to Coatesville) and one tie (Pennsbury 19-19) log into this finale and as in previous years our neighbors from Cornwells Heights stand in the way of another undefeated season for Neshaminy. It can truly be said that of all Lower Bucks Schools and coaches, Neshaminy has a greater football respect for the Owls and in particular the Owls of Marlon VanHorn. This season is no exception, for Bensalem breezed through the Section II teams and did not sustain a loss from any team in Section

Bensalem will be going with an all-veteran team and nothing would delight the Owls more than to be the only team in eastern Pennsylvania to turn the tables on the Redskins. Senior standouts for Bensalem include Al Heller, Ben Herb, Charles Mudie, Charles and Bill Peacock, Bill Stubbs, John Wolaniuk, Charles Nixon, Lewis Adams, and Co-Captains Henry George and James Dettmer.

For the Redskins it is time once again to recognize the boys who will be playing their last game for Neshaminy. Ends Milt Rassier, Wesley Harris, Jerry Dorland, Phil Lange, John Vosburgh, John McCarty and Rich Lauther; Tackles Ralph Basch, Ed Michael, Bob Andrassy, John Wichelman, Rudy Kalan; Guards Bruce Galvin, John Reeves, Jack Winder; Centers Bob Cummings and Richard Andrews; and Backs Tom Preno, Mark Ciccone, Bob Barr, Maury Tome. For John Petercuskie's Redskins this game seems almost anti-climatic to 13-6 win over the Easton Red Rovers, to its victories over Bethlehem and Bishop Kenrick and the 14-14 tie with Allentown. The Lower Bucks Championship has actually diminished in importance; however, Neshaminy would not feel right giving this honor to someone else.

There is no doubt that the players on both these teams do not respect the Section titles for this traditional game. To the Redskins and the Owls this game is for the championship of Lower Bucks County football. While the Redskins have gone through the local teams in the manner of a "Redskin massacre" the Owls have only been stymied by a tie with the Falcons while clobbering the remaining schools on their schedule. The stage is set for two best football teams in Lower Bucks to decide one champion. Tonight marks the end to another successful football season for the NESHAMINY REDSKINS—indeed, the 1962 REDSKINS have been the most successful of the past eleven years of Lower Bucks County League Champions. Certainly no one would want to imply that the 1962 REDSKINS are perfect, Coach Petercuskie and the players themselves would be the first ones to deny this; but even the most critical observers of this fall sport walk away from a Neshaminy contest amazed at the near-perfect execution of offensive and defensive assignments.

This team definitely successes as were many of their predecessors. Even so, demonstrated to the newly-formed Eastern Pennsylvania Football Conference schools that Neshaminy would not only take its part as a member of that new league, but that the Redskins are waiting for those schools to prove themselves equal to the perennial Lower Bucks Champions. On the other hand, Neshaminy once again made another fact clearer than ever before—that any similarity to the Lower Bucks teams and the Neshaminy Redskins has to be a gross misjudgment. This is not to say that the Redskins should discontinue to play the Lower Bucks schools, on the contrary, it would please many—most of all the players and myself-if Neshaminy would continue to play all of the Lower Bucks schools.





football squad shows that not one of these boys, as sophomores, played a vital role in that team's 10 wins and one tie season. The only boys to be recognized as "members" of the team were Vosburgh, Lauther, Preno, Rassier, Barr, and Cummings. Those were the Schuh-Stricker-

Currie days of over-powering football.

Last season the Redskins were blessed with one of the most powerful and destructive lines to wear the Red and Blue. Bob Cummings, center; Tom Preno, blocking back; and Bob Barr, wingback, were the only three boys to share a starting spot on the 1961 offensive team. Rich Lauther was already recognized as a defensive stalwart but most of the other 21 seniors graduating in June 1963 were part of the second and third teams. However, many of these 21 seniors did play a major role in the success of the 1961 Champions. In addition to the four boys mentioned above, one would have to recognize Milt Rassier, Ralph Basch, Bruce Galvin, Ed Michael, John Reeves, Tack Winder, John Vosburgh, and John Wichelman as contributing factors in last year's 11 win—one loss slate.

So, finally, it is September 1962 and the Neshaminy coaches are faced with their most formidable schedule of the three years that they have been in complete charge of the Redskins. Lacking the services of the big backfield stars of the 1960 season and the destructive line of the 1961 season, the 1962 seniors with help from a few noteworthy juniors and a sophomore or two set out to "conquer the east" (eastern section of Pennsylvania).

Number 1—As in the past three years the Eagles of Bishop Egan would be the first to "bite the dust" as last year's Lower Bucks scoring champ Bob Baxter, tallied four times to lead the 'Skins to a 40-12 opening victory. This win was highlighted by alert defensive play by Bob Cummings, Tom Preno and Rich Lauther and also by the accurate passing arm of Bill Brundzo good for almost 100 is through the air.

Number 2—Chester's final fracas with the Redskins was a duplicate of the past four as Neshaminy rolled to an impressive 54-0 win. Seven different Redskins took part in the scoring party and three of the scores were via the air route. The 1962 offensive line was considered to

just overloaded with talent. Defensively the Redskins shower no signs of weakness, the new season was in high gear and the boys were now ready for the Lehigh Valley

Number 3—The 1962 Redskins did something that their 1959, 1960, and 1961 squads could not do-hold the Easton Red Rovers to less than 13 points and claim victory over the upstate eleven. This again proved to be total team victory as the almost completely "senior" lines performed perfectly. The unquestioned field leadership of Tom Preno was never more visible than it was in the 13-7 win over Easton.

Number 4—The Allentown Canaries caught the 'Skins on the rebound of their Easton win and this match proved to be the toughest scrap on the Neshaminy field for many a year. The 14-14 tie tells only part of the grueling contest of these two very fine teams. Again it was a total team effort for the now recognized eastern power—

Number 5—The 1962 Redskins have had to play under the most adverse weather conditions and the constant rain at Bethlehem only momentarily deterred the offensive game but the boys were not to be denied their blaze of glory in the closing quarter to come off the field a 34-14 winner. This game with the Hurricanes unveiled a new Neshaminy football team—one that could work from the "T-formation" as well as the standard single-wing. Perhaps the overflow of backfield talent in Maury Tome and Bob Baxter at fullback, Bob Barr and Bill Brundzo at halfback, plus the versatility of Tom Preno were major factors for this switch in offense.

Numbers 6-7-8-9—Even in the midst of state-wide recognition with the Eastern Pennsylvania giants our boys were quick to realize that "there is no place like home" in Lower Bucks County League football. Bob Barr led an eight touchdown attack of the Rams as Neshaminy drubbed Woodrow Wilson 53-6. This was only a taste of what was to come for the next four weekends.

Next in line was Pennsbury. The Falcons were loaded with full-fledged veterans of the past two years and were now being coached by a man who was particularily interested in "locking horns with Neshaminy." the hands of once-powerful Pennsbury. Bob Baxter, who as a junior, is breaking all scoring records in the league and district, once again led the attack with four more T.D.'s while his mates Barr, Brundzo and Tome added to the massacre.

One week later in a driving snow storm the Delhaas Tigers kept Neshaminy on their toes for the first half, but had to succumb to the fast charging line and the running of Bob Baxter who tallied all 26 points to win 26-6.

The Panthers of William Tennent have given the Redskins some good games over the years, but the Monday night 55-0 thumping only served as a warmup for the week's varsity game with Bishop Kenrick. The Tennent game allowed every uniformed player a chance to mix it up a little and indications are good that Neshaminy may be in the running again in 1963. This win also brought Championship number 11 to Neshaminy High School and emphasized the need for the Redskins to look elsewhere for competition.

Number 10—When the 1962 season is history, the Redskins will have to look back at the Bishop Kenrick game as one of the toughest battles of the season. Allentown and Easton would be the only two stronger teams to match yards with the 'Skins. To halt the Redskins within the fifteen yard line is an accomplishment and the Golden Knights did this on numerous occasions; however, the Savages can also take credit for its unyielding strength in times of need. A game which should have been 14-0 ended up in a scramble at 20-6 for the Redskins. This game was not decided by one player, but again by a whole host of boys. Mark Ciccone's open field tackle was just a sample of the tenacious drive of the many unsung heroes on this team.

Number 11—Bensalem—

The 1962 Redskins are a proud band of football players. They believe very determinedly in the ten-year heritage of football champions left to them and to our school. They not only believe in this but they feel duty-bound to have it continued. To call attention to any one of these twenty-one seniors would be to call attention to everyone. To call attention to the offense would be to

call out the entire offensive line who continued to lead the way for an outstanding set of backs. This team was outweighed many times but were never to be outscored. The veteran backfield was to include everything a fourman backfield could contain—leadership, passing, speed, power and the ability to use the men up front for countless scores.

Defensively, the Savages were as strong as they have ever been. If one were to examine the scores against Neshaminy in its four major games it would show that of these T.D.'s but one were on long runs or passes rather than by grinding through our defensive stalwarts. Easton's only counter was on a 64 yard run; Allentown's first score was by picking up a loose ball and going 30 yards; both of Bethlehem's scores were on 65 and 70 yard touchdowns; and Kenrick scored on a 25-yard pass in the last seconds. Each of these scores could probably have been prevented had the secondary defense aintained a closer knit surveilance of its prime responsibility.
