## Krusen helps Neshaminy steal a comeback victory at Bensalem

Because of the mistakes against Dieruff, Neshaminy coach Mark Schmidt conducted long, grueling practices, and it beloed Krusen play

"The last game, I wasn't all up there." Krusen said. "I wasn't psychod up or anything, but today I was so psyched up. That week of practice was maybe the hardest week of practice I ever had. (Schmidt) worked us hard. He wants

seconds left. Krusen tied the same at 13 during the Owls' ensuing series when he picked off Dunner at the 38-yard line and ran unscathed to the end

zone with # 47 left. Bensalem regained the lead when Keith Davis scored on a 65-yard sprint, but the Redskins took the
