## ennridge wins on clutch FG

Jason Friel's 21-yard kick in OT lifted the Rams to a comeback victory over Neshaminy, 24-21.

Whether it's trying to stop a penalty kick in soccer or tempting a game-winning field goal, Jason Friel says he is not

the type to get overly nervous.
"I live for pressure, I have no
problem with it," said Friel, a senior and first-year member of the Pennridge football squad.

One of his teammates told a slightly different story shortly after Friel drilled a 21-yard field goal in overtime to lift the Rams past Neshaminy, 24-21, yester-

day at Poppy Yoder Field.
"He told me he was shaking before he kicked it," Tom Cressman said. "But he got it through. That's [what] matters."

Friel, a goalkeeper and captain in soccer, sent his kick inside the right upright and the Rams began celebrating a come-from-behind Pennridge trailed, 140, at halftime of the Suburban One League National Conference cross-division thriller. "This is one of the best come-

back wins we've had in the seven years I've been here," Pennridge coach Jeff Hollenbach said.

Neshaminy, ranked No. 8 in outheastern Pennsylvania by The Inquirer, nearly triumphed without head coach Mark Schmidt. The fiery leader was suspended for three games last week by the school district for on undisclosed reason

Showing support for Schmidt, many Neshaminy players had white tape wrapped around their left or right wrist, with "Coach Schmidt" or "Coach" written in black.

"He's helped shape the lives of these kids," Neshaminy assis-tant Steve Wilmot said. "They miss him."

Wilmot, normally the offensive line coach, handled many on-field decisions. He was assisted by Jay Weidenbaugh John Quinn, Roger Grove and

Eric Deitz, among others. Wilmot said he and Schmidt met at Wilmot's house Friday to discuss the game plan. Schmidt cannot attend practices or games, but is allowed to commu-

game, Neshaminy tailback Rodney Davis (154 yards on 19 car-ries) escaped for an 80-yard touchdown. Then, just before the first quarter ended, quarterback Stu Madden hit wideout George Coleman with a short pass over the middle. Coleman turned it into a 63-vard score.

It was a different Pennridge team after intermission. The Rams (3-1), produced three straight TDs to take a 21-14 lead

with 2 minutes, 11 seconds left. Cressman a senior halfback and safety, tied the game at 14 early in the fourth quarter 100

and tossed a 24-yard pass to for a 47-yard score, wideout Kevin White. Neshaminy had

David Cressman, a more halfback and Tom's brother, scored the go-ahead TD on a 14-yard rumble through the heart of Neshaminy's defense. With junior halfback Ryan Greiser sidelined because of a shoulder injury, senior fullback Ryan Shoultes rushed 11 times for 117 yards. The Cressman
