Patriots' line play conquers Redskins

Neshaminy coach John Chaump usually stands when he addresses the press after games

On this night, Chaump was slumped on a gymnasium bench. He appeared tired and beaten, much like his football team had

looked during a 37-14 loss to visiting Central Bucks East on Friday.

With only seven lettermen returning this season, Chaump knew he would be lucky to go over .500 while playing in the new — and tough Suburban One alignment.

Now at 45 (2-5 in the league) with two games to play, Neshaminy proba-bly will not break even. "We've got some good football play-ers, but this has been a year where

everyone else has some great football players," Chaump said.

Consider Central Bucks East. The Patriots (8-2, 6-1) have superior tal-ent up and down their lineup and especially on their offensive line, which led the way to a season-high 303 yards rushing against the Redskins. East dominated both lines of scrimmage, turning short-yardage plays into big gainers on offense, and snuffing out Redskins drives on de-

East held Neshaminy to 129 yards rushing and a measly 16 yards pass ing. That passing total might be the lowest Redskins mark since

"I don't know," Chaump said. Until Friday, no one had ever run up 303 yards on Chaump, either. Credit East's multitalented back-

field of quarterback Sean Lenz (87 yards rushing, 1 touchdown), full-back Curt Hahn (67 yards, 1 touch-down) and tailback Dave Zerby (73 yards, 1 touchdown).

Lenz also completed 8 of 12 passes for 95 yards and a touchdown.

Also credit left offensive tackle Dodd Stretch. At 6 feet, 4 inches and 235 pounds, Stretch opened gaping holes for Hahn and Zerby, particu-larly in the first half when the Pats rushed for 242 yards and took a 23-0


Stretch was so excited, he asked coach Larry Greene at halftime for some more plays over his tackle spot

"I asked him to run a few quarter-back draws," Stretch said with a smile. East ran several, one of which resulted in a Lenz touchdown.

"Boy did that offensive line do a heck of a job," Greene said. "We had good pass protection too."

Lenz had good receivers, including Brian Penecale, a 6-2, 200-pound senior split end with Division I potential. Penecale caught 4 passes for 68 yards, including a 12-yard touchdown from Lenz

His 36-yard reception in the second quarter off a square-in pattern set up Brett Sleicher's 28-yard field goal for a 17-0 lead. The catch was sensational as Lenz threaded the needle past

defender Joe Gettis, and Penecale dived for the ball.

"Gettis was stride for stride with the kid," Chaump said. "I've seen that kid play. What a great athlete." East had far too many of them against Neshaminy.


Neshaminy had just 26 total yards of offense in the first half - a season

Mike Rizzo and quarterback-of-thefuture Joe Mormello had rushing touchdowns for Neshaminy, but neither score occurred at a time when the lead was within reach.

"Their offensive line is excellent," Chaump said. "Where have you ever seen simple dive plays end up becoming 30-yard gains?

This season, it is happening a lot to Neshaminy.
