## RICHARD BEACH - PENNINGTON PREP

Coach Poore from Pennington Prep considers RICHARD BEACH a well rounded candidate for the top scholar-athlete award. Like so many of the better football players, Dick excelled as both defense and offense as a fullback and line backer on the Big Red Team. He won the school plaque for outstanding leadership on the football field. He is a varsity member of the wrestling and track teams.

Besides being a fine student, he is a dormitory proctor, a member of the student council, sports editor of the year book, president of the history club, an eagle scout and was the senior patrol leader at the National Jamboree for Boy Scouts. He is also a talented guitar player.

## JAMES BREWER - MORRISVILLE

It is a rare occasion when an athlete is rated by his school as the No. 1 student and No. 1 football player. JAMES BREWER of Morrisville ranks first in a class of over 200 and, despite being only 160 lbs., he played both as a linebacker and interior lineman for Coach John Fidi-shun. James made All-County and the Lower Bucks Section II teams.

He has shown outstanding leadership as the captain of the team and in student council activities. He has been selected

as a Scholar-Athlete in the Philadelphia area.

James, who is already majoring in Civil Engineering at his school, plans to further his education in this field at one of the better engineering universities.

## TOM BUTTERFOSS - PRINCETON

Tom Butterfoss, the giant, 6'4", 220 lb. tackle from Princeton who made the area All Star team on defense and offense last year, was slowed up a bit this year by a leg injury but still continued his All County stature in leading the Little Tigers to a fine 7-2 record. This gave them the Mercer County and Southern Group IV championship. Coach Wood rated his star the best two-way player "he has ever coached". As co-captain Tom radiated enthusiasm, pride, and spirit to his teammates with his leadership. Tom is a pitcher and first baseman on the baseball team.

He is an honor student in the advanced academic program. He has received the coveted Gold Key Award and has been the Kiwanis Club "Youth-of-the-Month". The likeable youngster is probably headed to an Ivy League school where he plans to study engineering.

Glowing tributes were paid him by the faculty, counsellors, and principals. His electronics teacher, Mr. Francisco, wrote: "He is a highly motivated, self-reliant student who is satisfied with

nothing less than perfection in every endeavor". Principals Michaels said: "I can only say that if I had a son, I would want him to be just like Tom Butterfoss".

### GEORGE CARMICHAEL - ALLENTOWN

Coach Roy Feldman had a very successful season this last year. The center (the position he played) of the drive toward Allentown's fine season was George Carmichael.

This fine young man is preparing for a career in teaching. His excellent traits in leadership will be of great value in moulding future youth.

Coach Feldman says he is unreserved in his praise of George, believing his high marks in studies will qualify him for any college.

### JOHN CLAGHORN - PRINCETON DAY

Said Coach Dan Barren of Princeton Day School: "John Claghorn has played offensive halfback and defensive line-backer for four years -- he has provided the kind of leadership a coach always seeks. During the past two seasons, he has led his team in scoring and has been second in individual tackling. His outstanding play led P.D.S. to an undefeated season in '66".

John was an All Prep second team choice this year. He excels in hockey and baseball, is the president of the A.A., sports editor for the "Spokesman", and a member of the Social Service Committee. He is a good student.

### GARY CONFER - LAWRENCEVILLE

Gary Confer was the workhouse for Coach Ken Keuffel's Lawrenceville team. The Red and Black tailback averaged 6.3 yards per carry, scored 10 touchdowns, completed 50% of his passes, and did all the punting for his team. He threw 3 touchdown passes, one of which went for 82 yards. On defense he played a strong safety man position. The 180 lb., 5'10" Gary was selected for the All State prep school team.

Gary is a ranking student and scored high in the college board exams.

The new and able coach is unstinting in his praise of this fine young man's modesty, along with outstanding accomplishments.

### GARY CORTINA - STEINERT

Coach Peter Brescia's Gary Cortina is going to make some college football coach happy. This rugged, 200 lb. tackle from Steinert was a strong offensive lineman. He beat out some talented big men to make the Mercer County first team.



Gary rates higher in character and is a fine citizen.

He is ranked in the top third in scholarship at this big school.

### GORDON DAVIES - PENNSBURY

Coach Eric Baugher, who always puts together a fine team in his tough league, came up with an excellent 7-2-1 record this year. The Pennsbury School from Fallsington, Pa., won the Lower Bucks County championship. The key to the team's success was the 205 lb., 5'10" Gordon Davies who played 100% of the time on defense and offense as a linesman. He was rewarded by being placed on the All Bucks County Team.

Baugher rated him a #1 player "in all around football ability, leadership, team and competitive spirit, and eager to pursue worthy goals." Mr. W. Henry reports that he is an outstanding student and citizen.

### MIKE DRULIS - NOTRE DAME

Mike Drulis, the 190 lb., 6'1" quarterback, has been the pride and joy of Coach Walter Porter's Notre Dame team. The burly T-back who co-captained his team is also a varsity performer in baseball and basketball. Coach Porter rates him a superb and resourceful player who is the coach on the field.

He runs well and is a terrific passer-thrower.

Mike has had three years of varsity competition and as a sophomore had been given recognition on the All County. His outstanding offensive play has been recognized by the All County selectors during his junior and senior years. Coach Porter has sent in a page of offensive statistics on this young man's accomplishments that are too long to mention in this short biography.

Mike holds a high academic rank in his school, is a regular member of the Honor Roll and carries a better than 90 average for four years. He is a member of the National Honor Society, alternate for "Boys State", and vice-president of the Key Club.

The Rev. Thomas A. Coffey, the principal at Notre Dame, rates him a perfect young man with qualities that make for an outstanding citizen. Coach Porter said: "Of the 100 inquiries relative to going to college, the football coach who lands him will find him a gentleman and a complete quarterback.

With his scholastic record, he has to rate top consideration.

### ARTHUR EDINGER - DEL. VALLEY REGIONAL

Coach "Cap" Webb, Delaware Valley Regional, nominated an outstanding player in Arthur Edinger. Arthur has three years of varsity competition behind him and

this past season he acted as Captain of the team. He made the All Hunterdon County team for two years and was selected on the All Trenton Suburban team and on the All State second team in Group No. 1 this year. All opponents considered him a terrific defense player on the varsity baseball team. He is the Senior Class President, member of the Student Council, member of the National Honor Society, attended Boys' State, an Eagle Scout, ranks 6th in a class of 152 and has exceptionally high college board scores.

Delaware Valley Regional received special recognition from the N. J. S. I. A. A. because of their splendid record this past season.

### LEWIS FLACK - EWING

Lewis Flack from Ewing features the academic as his school's nominee for scholar-athlete. Lewis is second in a class of 395, working in superior and advanced groups in all subjects. He scored a whopping 1,411 in his college board exams.

Lewis has been the secretary of the Key Club for two years, on the Student Council, alternate to Boy's State, and represented his school at the Fort Monmouth Science Seminar. He won the science award in biology as a sophomore. He expects to go to an outstanding school in the field of architecture.

Coach Steve Muench rated him one of the stronger members of his fine team, which received special recognition from the N. J. S. I. A. A. because of their excellent record. Lewis played 90% of the time on the offensive unit.

### JAMES FLAM - TRENTON CENTRAL

Though playing on a weak Trenton Central eleven, James Flam and his outstanding performances throughout the season were a cause for real enthusiasm.

The burly, 6'1", 215 lb. senior played his center post with reckless abandon and brought praise from many of the opposing coaches. They considered him the best middle man they faced all season. Jim's stellar play earned him the center position on the All Mercer County first offensive team.

His academic average of B is most commendable and this, plus his football ability, has many college football coaches casting a covetous eye in his direction.

### GARY GRAY - BISHOP EGAN

With only three starters back from the great 1966 Philadelphia City Championship team, Coach Dick Bedesen never thought his team would reach the pinnacle again this year.

Anchored by the brawny, 6'1", 197 lb.



Gary Gray, the defensive, interior line-man was the key to the 1967 success. The Bishop Egan record of 11-1 and the second straight title win in the 30th Greater Philadelphia Championship shows how remarkable the defensive unit was. Gary, who was a co-captain of the Eagles, was selected on many All Teams in the area, received the greatest honor when he was selected on the All Pennsylvania 33 Team which will play a comparable team from Texas in late summer.

The Rev. G. Dailey, the guidance director rates him a perfect one in scholastic and leadership abilities. He is a member of the National Honor Society where he won second honors and has received the N. E. D. T. certificate.

Many college football coaches have been knocking at his door. He is worth the effort and promises a great college performance.

### BRYAN FREEMAN - BURLINGTON TWP.

All area football enthusiasts are proud of Coach Doug MacLachlan's team with its 8-1 record. Burlington Township was given special recognition by the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association.

One of the strong reasons why the team was so successful was Bryan Freeman. This small, 5'9", 160 lb. Negro star was a giant on defense and a very elusive ball-carrier on offense. He was honored by being elected captain at the end of the season and placed on the All Burlington

County and All State Group 1 first teams. He is a varsity performer in two other sports.

Bryan is the president of the B. T. H. S. chapter of the National Honor Society. He hopes to matriculate at either West Point or the Naval Academy.

Principal John Maher was happy to state: "Bryan is a truly outstanding young man -- 1. academically he is number one in the class; 2. he is popular and respected by students and faculty -- modest and unassuming -- leads by example; 3. dedicated and loyal to his family, fellow students, school, and country."

### DON HAWKEY - RANCOCAS VALLEY REG.

Another team that had a great season was Coach Bill Gordon's Rancocas Valley Regional eleven. They were given special recognition by the N. J. S. I. A. A. because of their excellent record. Because of the achievements of 6', 195 lb. Don Hawkey the past two years, the team has posted a 16-2 record.

Coach Gordon who is also the school guidance counselor has this to say about this tremendous football end who made the All Burlington eleven: "He has been or is near the top of his class for four years -- an industrious young man -- a superb athlete in football, baseball and basketball -- mature poise and character,



with obviously fine home training which reflects his fine ideals; National Honor Society; student leader, etc."

He is planning for a college program in chemical engineering and is being considered for matriculation at Dartmouth, Brown, and Pennsylvania.

### JOHN HILL - FRANKLIN TWP.

Member of the National Honor Society, secretary of the Varsity Club, Sophomore Class treasurer, Senior Class vice-president, and still have time to win varsity letter in football, wrestling, track, and gymnastics is the story on John Hill from Franklin Township High School. Coach Pat Dolan said "he was our workhorse, as was our star player."

He is the school's nominee -- the committee lacked information on his scholastic marks.

### DAN HOUGH - ST. ANTHONY'S

Co-captain Dan Hough was selected as St. Anthony's outstanding scholar-athlete. Coach Tony Nitti gives much credit to Dan for helping his team to a better season.

Dan played 90% of each game and his inspired play and leadership was very evident throughout the season.

His student rating was in the top third of this high level school.

### CRAIG JOHNS - NESHAMINY

Coach Peter Cordelli is slowly bringing back Neshaminy to the football glory they enjoyed in the past. Craig Johns, the speedy 5'9", 170 lb. back was the star of the Pennsylvania eleven. He was honored by his school with the title of "Mr. Red-skin". Craig played both offense and defense but can be best remembered for his strong offensive play, where he was named to the first All Bucks County Team as a back.

Craig, an excellent scholar, carries a rigorous academic program. At present, he is registered in advanced work in English, Algebra, and Physics. Guidance director William Macht has written, "Craig is a student for whom we could give only the highest recommendation."

### KEN KELLY - HUN SCHOOL

Dean Bing from the Hun School writes that Ken Kelly is an outstanding young man who has assumed great responsibility above and beyond those normally experienced by secondary school athletes. He was selected as a Senior Proctor by the Resident Faculty and Administration and has served very well in this capacity. In addition, he volunteered and now participates in a community service program



where visits are made to the State Mental Hospital in Trenton and work is done with brain damaged and psychologically impaired children. This is a boy who commands the respect and admiration of everyone in our community.

Coach Waterman said: "He merited the selection to the second All Prep squad, as he played almost 90% of the time -- he was one of the main cogs for the second place finish of our team in the Conference".

### ROBERT KUGLER - PEDDIE

Six feet three inches and 200 is the size of Peddie's stellar end, Robert Kugler who won the distinction of being selected on the State's All Prep team as an end. Coach Paul heaped much praise on his great offensive end. He summed it all up by saying: "As a football player, he is a competitive but thorough gentleman".

Headmaster Albert Kerr termed him a fine student and an excellent citizen. Bob has shown leadership as an officer in many of the school clubs and as captain of the baseball team where he also merited All State rank as a catcher.

Robert will have no trouble going to any school of his choice as he is a top student in the senior class and has excellent college board scores.

A combination hard to beat -- scholar and athlete.

### NORMAN GRECZYN - HIGHTSTOWN HIGH

Having no shadow to fall nor footsteps to fall, the Hightstown players who are new to the sport found themselves competing in varsity competition for the first time this past season. Attitudes and skills were quickly learned which made them a creditable season. One who made the most progress and proved to be the mainstay of Coach Paul Snyder's eleven was Norman Greczyn.

Norman has shown leadership as President of his home room, membership on the Student Council and is troop leader in the Boy Scouts. He is an Eagle Scout, and is of the Order of the Arrow. He attended the New Mexico jamboree. As a student he is in the National Honor Society and ranks in the top 10% of 187 students.

Guidance Counsellor Harold Cox reports that "he possesses the sincerity, responsibility, seriousness of purpose, emotional stability and the personal initiative to be an outstanding candidate".

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Two late entries

DOUGLAS STEVENS - GEORGE SCHOOL

Coach Bob Geisinger is unreserved in his recommendation of "Doug" Stevens. As a ball carrier, he led the team with 500 yards and 8 touchdowns to the conference championship.

This young man is ranked tops as a school citizen and campus leader.

As to studies, he is in the top 10% - and close to the top of the 33 high schools with his College Board score of over 1,300; a combination hard to beat -- "scholar and athlete."

JOSEPH SUOZZO - SOUTH HUNTERDON  
LAMBERTVILLE

This young man comes with top credentials. He was co-captain of the 1967 team, an inexperienced team that looked to Joseph for the leadership inspiration, says his coach. This stocky guard averaged 23 tackles per game as a line backer. Playing full games, offense and defense, he was named "Iron Man," selected All State Group 1 and was County Guard.

He ranked second in his class in studies and was President of his senior class, and came out top in College Board scores. "Need we say more?", asks his coach, Sam Jeffries.

JOSEPH NOVALIS - BORDENTOWN REGIONAL

"Joseph Novalis from Bordentown Regional was the best senior player and scholar on the team. He played 90% of each game. He is a great leader, has tremendous school spirit, and is respected by his fellow students and the faculty", states his coach.

STEVE PARKER - FLORENCE

Coach Joe Papp brought forth another fine eleven this year. The Florence High School team received special recognition from the N. J. S. I. A. A.

Steve Parker was the backbone of this highly rated team. Here are some of his credentials that made him the 1967-68 scholar-athlete from his school: Captain of the team, three sport star, president of the student council, president of the senior class, represented his school at Boys State, member of Key Club, "Flash" staff, Language Club, etc. This above-average student was also selected as a scholar-athlete by the Philadelphia Bulletin.

Writes his Principal, Miss Ethel K. Elliott: "I am mighty proud of our Student Council President, Stephen Parker, for it was he who organized and led a "Support Our Country" rally and led a group in marching to show that not all young people are draft card burners".



## RICHARD RAINS - LAWRENCE

Lawrence High School is new at football. In spite of new athletic skills that are hard to learn, Richard Rains proved to be the best learner and approached the play of some of the seasoned players in the area.

Richard is a fine scholar-athlete and received the nomination of Lawrence High coach and officials.

## HAROLD SCHMITZ - SOUTH BRUNSWICK

Coach Tony Toto from South Brunswick rated Harold Schmitz his outstanding player. Harold played right guard on offense and middle linebacker on defense. He was selected on the second team All Conference and All Suburban, which included the largest schools in his area. He also made the third All State team in Group I.

Harold showed outstanding leadership in school activities and as captain of his team. He is also a star in wrestling and baseball.

He is an above average student, states his coach and guidance counsellor.

## RICHARD SHINN - BURLINGTON CTY.

When Richard Shinn, whose father is

in the military, moved this last summer with his family from Alabama to Northern Burlington County Regional High School in Columbus, he was destined to make the athletic coaches quite pleased. He soon made his mark in football as he proceeded on his way to the All League, All Burlington County and All Delaware Valley teams.

He was a star on defense and led his team in scoring and ground gaining. This "might-mite" was elected co-captain at the end of the season. He is also an excellent track man and wrestler.

Dick ranks second in a class of over 200 and in his Junior College Board exams reached an exceptionally high 1,432. He received all A's and made the high honor roll for the first marking period and is a semi-finalist on the National Merit Scholarship Test.

Last summer Richard was invited to study at the National Science Foundation program at the University of Wyoming. He hopes to major in physics at college and eventually to get his doctorate in this field.

## ROBERT TAYLOR - TRENTON STATE

Robert Taylor, Trenton State College's nominee, was a three-sport star at Newark's West Side High School. He was the co-captain of coach Higgin's highly regarded Newark eleven.

Bob is a transfer student from Kentucky State College and, after sitting out one year of competition for Coach Bob Salois, he proved to be Trenton State's outstanding back. The co-captain of the Lion team won the Game Ball Award in the game against the conference champions.

A senior major in the department of Health and Physical Education, Bob is carrying a 2.7 academic average and reaped further honors by being elected to Who's Who in American Colleges.

A highly worthy candidate from Trenton State.

### EDWARD VOGLER - HAMILTON

Considering that this was a rebuilding year, Coach Dave Bryan had a respectable 4-5 season and the man who contributed most toward this excellent effort was captain and full back Edward Vogler. In his 3 years of football Eddie played a number of assignments and performed very well. In his final year he played 100% offense and carried the pigskin 101 times for a 4 yd. average and did the team punting. He played defense 50% of the time. From the following, you will learn why he is Hamilton's scholar-athlete nominee.

As a frosh he was captain of that football team and became president of the Student Council and won the American Legion Award - As a soph he was president of his class - As a Jr. he was president of his class, V.P. of Varsity Club, member of

Canteen Council, varsity baseball Boy's State representative and 55th out of class of 408 in studies - As a Sr. he is president of Sr. Class and Varsity H. Club and on the All Hamilton Township St. Football Team.

Writes Principal George J. Murphy, "Edward is a youth who best typifies the composite of character, courtesy, ability and capacity that are rarely found among teen-agers of any generation.

Eddie has been president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship for the past two years. His tremendous capacity for responsibility coupled with his perseverance at all times to maintain a challenging record of studies, have encouraged us to support Edward Vogler for your fine award".

### ROBERT WEBER - PRINCETON

Coach Dick Colman nominated Robert Weber as his scholar athlete.

This will mark the second honor of its type to accrue to the Princeton tailback since he concluded his varsity career last November. He was named one of 13 college seniors to win National Football Foundation Fellowships for graduate study at the annual Hall of Fame Dinner in New York City on December 5.

A graduate of Manville (N.J.) High School, where he took part in football, basketball and baseball, Weber earned two varsity football letters at Princeton.



He suffered a hampering muscle injury during his junior season but still accounted for 453 yards of total offense. As a senior, he held the starting tailback role until a knee injury midway through the season restricted his playing time, still he gained 725 yards.

His coach said: "He is an outstanding student and will be a candidate for a Rhodes Scholarship. I can think of no boy better qualified in every way for the Delaware Valley Award."

### BOB WOLFRUM - WM, TENNETT

Coach John Harrington from William Tennett nominated Bob Wolfrum as his scholar-athlete. Coach Harrington said he was a power for us on the offense and defense where he played with very little rest.

Bob also excelled in the classroom. His exact record on classroom work was not submitted, nor the guidance counselor's opinion.

It suffices to say he was the approved choice of his class at William Tennett.
