## 'Skins Now 2-0 In Section One

Neshaminy High School's brilliant football team passed another test with flying colors and is now ready for its final exam. The Redskins had the right answers last night and turned in their seventh perfect paper in eight attempts by outscoring visiting William Tennent High School, 35-6, before 5,500 fans. Neshaminy's only near failure was a 6-6 tie with Allentown's Dieruff High.

Neshaminy is now 2-0 in Section One of the Lower Bucks County Football League. The Redskins are 7-0-1 in all games.

### The Big Test

The Redskins will try for high honors next week when they match ability on the gridiron with undefeated Pennsbury High School. Pennsbury has passed every test (7-0) and also wants to be number one in the football graduating class for 1964.

Tennent, now 2-1, gave Neshaminy some uneasy moments early in the second period when it turned a blocked punt into a touchdown to shave Neshaminy's lead to 7-6. The 'Skins snapped right back with two fast scores before intermission to break Tennent's back with a commanding 21-6 lead.

Neshaminy punched over a pair of touchdowns in the second half to complete the rout.

### Kaminski Scores Two

Billy Kaminski, a hard-running 5'10, 160-pound senior scored twice for Neshaminy while Ted Boerckel (5-7, 157), Jimmy Colbert (6-2, 170) and Eric Hutchinson (5-8, 155) carved out other Redskins TDs. Neshaminy's George Nolte (5-9, 140) booted five extra points.

Tennent's Larry Krause was responsible for his team's lone score. Neshaminy's Denny Auckland was slow in punting on the last play of the first period. Head of the ball from his own 49 yard line when he was rushed by white-shirted defenders.

Krause blocked the punt and chased it back to the 22-yard line. A play later Mike Reilly barreled 17 yards to Neshaminy's two-yard stripe. On second down Reilly cracked into the end zone. Jerry Zweitzig's pass to Joe Samsei for the PAT was off the mark.

### Walker Stars

Jimmy Walker, Neshaminy's middle guard on defense, was unstoppable. The 5-9, 180 pound senior who just returned to the squad after eight weeks because of a knee injury, hauled down a score of Tennent runners during the game.

Boerckel got Neshaminy off to a 6-0 lead in the first period.

He broke through the line and headed up field. Tennent's Glenn Poore had Boerckel dead in his tracks. Boerckel made a beautiful fake and left Poore by the wayside as he streaked 48 yards to tally.

Colbert's one-yard buck with 5:45 left in the second period capped a 71-yard drive and gave Neshaminy a 14-6 lead.

### Colbert Trapped

With 1:11 before intermission Colbert was trapped while trying to pass. He changed direction and appeared to be nailed but flipped a 17-yard aerial to Kaminski who had blockers around him. Kaminski turned on the speed and buzzed 44 yards over the wide stripe to top a 61-yard maneuver which broke Tennent's spirit.

Kaminski, who's making a bid for all-Lower Bucks honors, scored again in the third period. He rolled 75 yards and Nolte converted to make it 28-6.

Neshaminy's last TD came with 2:05 in the game. The Redskins had the ball on the eight yard line. Hutchinson spun over the end and wiggled to the one-foot line. He took the pigskin again and was halted.

The 'Skins wanted him to score and gave him another assignment. This time he knifed into the end zone.

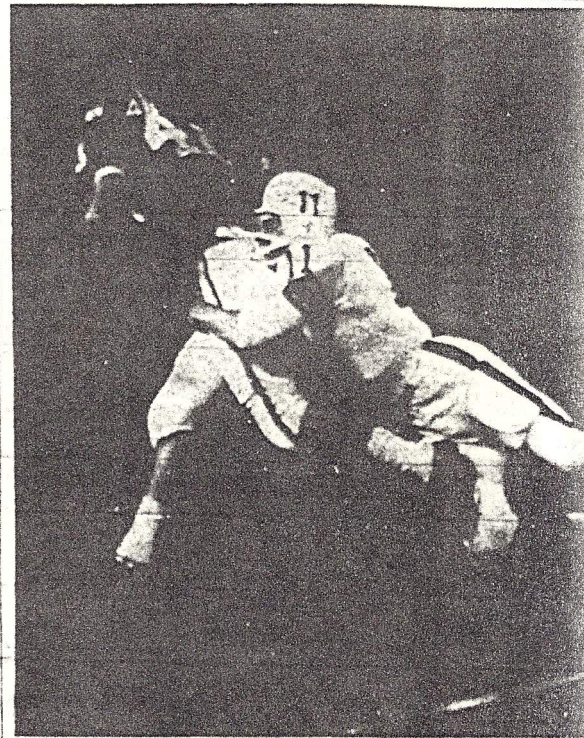
