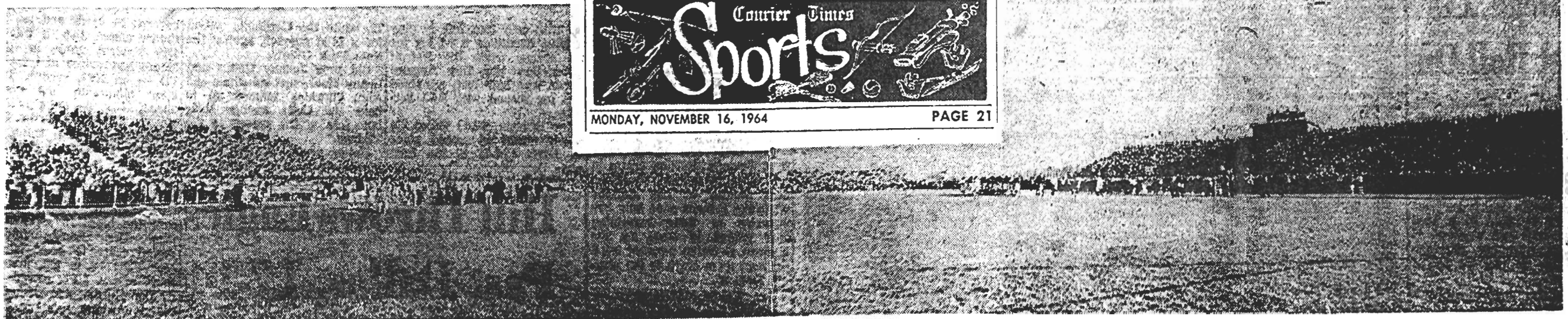
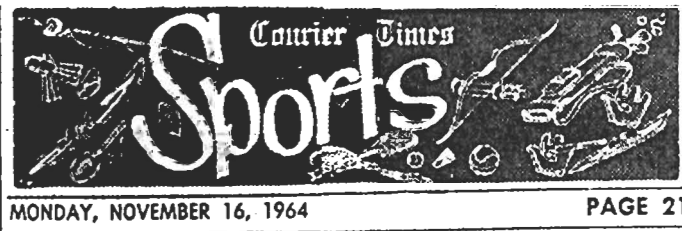


10,000 Fans See Falcons, 'Skins Follow '63 Script



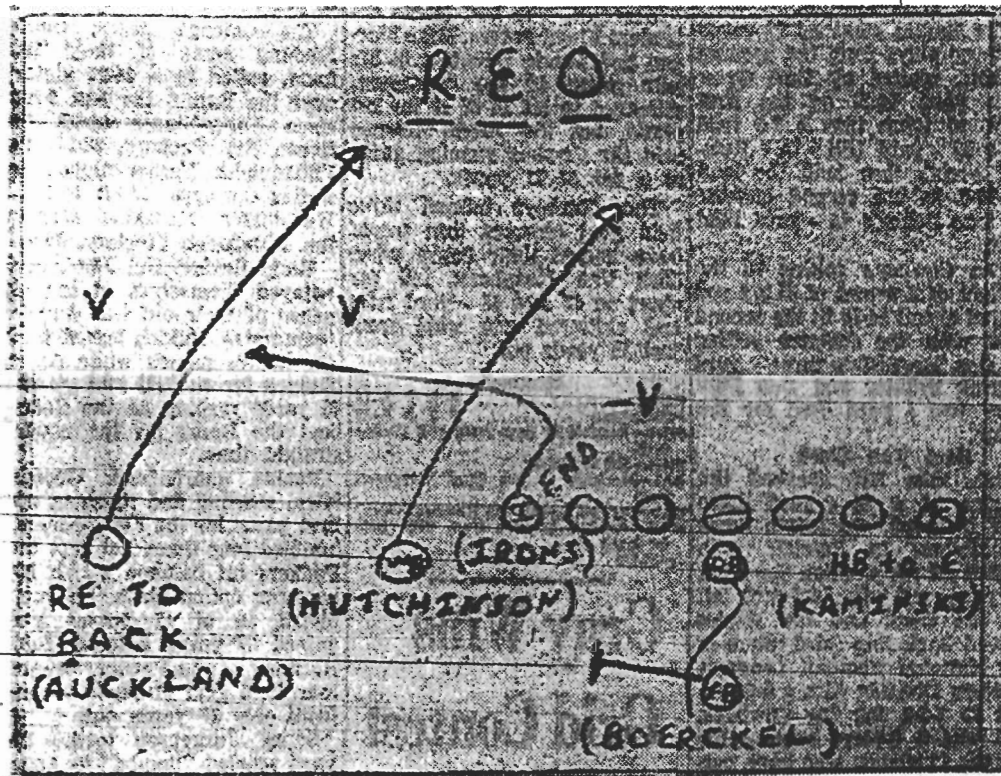
Football fans began piling into Pennsbury High School's football stadium early on Saturday morning in hopes of securing seats for the battle of the

unbeatens between Neshaminy and Pennsbury. A throng of over 10,000 fans were on hand for the 2 p.m. kickoff. It was the largest crowd ever to at-

tend a game at Falcon Field. Courier-Times Sports Photographer Alex Zidock caught the crowd as Neshaminy (right, center) huddles. Neshaminy ex-

A Key Play For Neshaminy

One PAT Decides Title

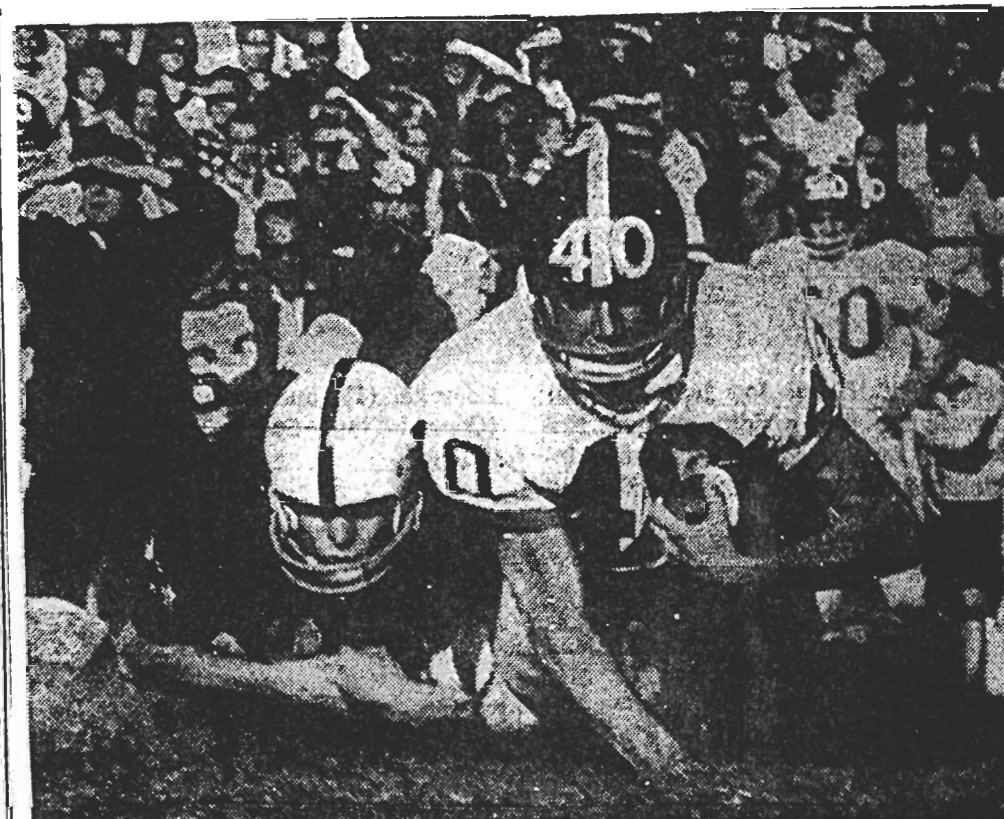

Burkhart lost the ball at the goal line and Kaminski recovered.

Neshaminy couldn't gain much ground and punted (into the wind) on third down to its own 34. Pennsbury marched right back down the field and this time, early in the final period, Burkhart dived over right guard for the final two yards.

Extra Point Falls

Pennsbury tried the exact same play for the extra point, which would have tied the contest, but the center of the Neshaminy forward wall stiffened and stopped Burkhart and he fumbled the ball.

In the final minute of play, Pennsbury marched from its own 22 to the Neshaminy 41 on three completed passes, but time ran out on the Falcons.

The victory gives John Petercuskie's Redskins a 3-0 Section One record and an 8-0-1 log in all games. Pennsbury is 2-1 in league play and 8-1 overall.

Each team has one game remaining against Delhaas.

'Cuskie Mixes New Wrinkles, Old Reliables To Win Crown

Neshaminy High School had planned a couple of new wrinkles to throw against Pennsbury in the battle of the unbeaten in Section One of the Lower Bucks County Football League on Saturday.

Redskin Coach John Petercuskie was also depending on some old fashion blocking and tackling to go along with kicking the ball should Neshaminy score.

Everything blended together to provide Neshaminy (8-0-1) a hard-fought 14-13 conquest of Pennsbury (8-1-0) before more than 10,000 fans.

The new wrinkle which had Pennsbury on the run was a pattern which Petercuskie calls LEO or REO. "Actually it is a

double flanker with the end flopped over in the backfield and the opposite end remains as an eligible receiver. It's a motion pass which was new. We usually go on short motion but we went long," Petercuskie said.

Neshaminy had a 7-0 lead late in the first period. Petercuskie ordered the REO play. It worked perfectly.

Denny Auckland, Neshaminy's right end, went to the left and stepped back one yard into the backfield. Eric Hutchinson, the wingback, and Andy Irons, the left end, were all eligible receivers on that play. Bill Kaminski, a halfback, took Auckland's slot on the line.

Auckland and Hutchinson ran regular patterns. Irons delayed and then moved into the open pocket. Jimmy Colbert's pass was true and Irons rumbled 38

yards to the four-yard line. Two plays later, Colbert cracked into the end zone and it was 14-0.

Erle Baugher, Pennsbury's coach, figured Neshaminy would throw more during the game but knew that "REO" had hit the Falcons hard and provided Neshaminy with its 14-point bulge.

"That was the only surprise they pulled," Baugher said.

Petercuskie said Neshaminy played the game based on scouting reports. "That play (REO) was important to us," he said.

Neshaminy gambled on defense, Petercuskie said. "We didn't have the football much in the second half and Pennsbury's pass off an odd formation

Kaminski Scoots 39
Billy Kaminski bolted off his own left tackle, found some daylight and raced 39 yards for the first Neshaminy score, with the clock showing 6:43 left in the opening quarter.

Quarterback Jimmy Colbert went over from the two with six seconds remaining in the period to cap a three-play, 42-yard march, for the second score. The key play was a 38-yard aerial from Colbert to end Andy Irons.

George Nolte kicked the extra point each time to give Neshaminy a 14-0 lead.

Pennsbury took up most of the second quarter to score a touchdown and get back in the game. Tackle Dave Pursell intercepted a Colbert pass, which had been deflected by a teammate, early in the second period.

Burkhart Scores
A 15-yard penalty tacked on the play gave the Falcons a first down on their own 48.

Fourteen plays later (1:15 to go in the half), Joe Hodgson carried it over on Pennsbury's power sweep play around right end. Bob Burkhart cracked into the end zone for the conversion.

Pennsbury drove 89 yards and 35 inches midway through the third period, only to lose a touchdown and possession on a fumble at the one inch line.

Stroudsburg's Ray Sparkles

Glen Ray, ex-Bensalem High quarterback, guided East Stroudsburg State Teachers College (8-1) to its first Pennsylvania State Colleges Football championship on Saturday afternoon.

Ray, a 1962 grad of Bensalem, ran for two touchdowns (both one-yard plunges) and threw for two other scores in Stroudsburg's 27-14 win over Indiana State (8-2).

The 5-6 signal caller, who was honorable mention on the 1961 Courier-Times All-Star team, fired TD aeriels of 16 and four yards. All told, Ray gained 81 yards rushing and completed three of four passes for 32 yards.

tion had us concerned," he said.

John Swartz, Neshaminy's backfield coach, was elated after the tilt. "Erle (Pennsbury's coach) stuck mostly to basic stuff. Pennsbury is a good football team. We didn't consider Cooper (BQI, Pennsbury's quarterback) as sharp as he was. He did a real good job," Swartz said.

"We were caught short a couple of times on defense but we had to stop Burkhart (Bob, Pennsbury's fullback). But Burkhart didn't run like the Burkhart of old," Swartz added.

The Neshaminy coaching staff cited Steve Pyle, Jack (Dynamite) Dunn, Auckland and Jimmy Walker for their defensive play and Ted Boerckel for blocking and the running of Billy Kaminski after the game.

George Nolte, Neshaminy's junior extra point specialist, wasn't overlooked in post-game comments. His two true boots proved the difference.

"I just feel great. I didn't think about the kicking them. I just had to do it," he said.

Pennsbury lofted 16 passes and hit on seven which accounted for 116 yards. It was more passes than Pennsbury has thrown in any other game this year.

"We thought they'd jam their defenses and we'd have to throw," Baugher said.

And then he added, "I feel sorry for that kid Burkhart. He dropped a big pass and it had to come in a big game."

Henry Morgan, Lower Bucks County's veteran referee, will be presented the game ball by the Neshaminy team. Morgan has been officiating 32 years and will retire after a game on Thanksgiving Day.

Morgan felt the game on Saturday was terrific. "It was one of the finest games I was ever associated with," he said.

Neshaminy's team buses were taken to the game by police escort.

Pennsbury's Ken Homa and Dennis Woomer played excellent games on defense. Joe Fioravanti and Cooper were outstanding when the Falcons had the ball. Fioravanti plays both ways while Cooper is the quarterback.

Neshaminy's Billy Kaminski scored the first touchdown on a 39-yard run in the first period. He tossed the ball into the stands.

Pennsbury used a regular football during the game. Neshaminy switched pigskins and used a "night ball" with stripes. It was Neshaminy's first daylight encounter of the year.

The wind was a factor. Twice Pennsbury punted into the wind in the first period and the boots only covered six and 16 yards. Both were on fourth down situations on Pennsbury's 39 and 41 yard lines.

Pennsbury's Burkhart had two costly fumbles. He fumbled on the goal line in the third period as the Falcons trailed, 14-7. He was stopped on his run for Pennsbury's 14th point but actually fumbled the ball again.

Henry Morgan had the overflow throng yelling in the second period. Pennsbury appeared to have a first down on the Neshaminy 14-yard line when the chain gang was summoned. Morgan was flat on his stomach to eye up the measurement. Pennsbury made it by an inch and scored a few minutes later.

Neshaminy now has a two-year victory streak of 19, including a pair of ties. Pennsbury saw an eight-game string shattered.

Wilt Back In Form, Nets 62 In Victory

You can't keep a good man down — and that goes double when referring to Wilt (The Stilt) Chamberlain.

The Stilt, recently recovered from a pancreas ailment which sidelined him throughout much of the National Basketball Association's early action, took a giant step towards his accustomed position atop the scoring leaders Sunday night by netting 62 points to lead the San Fran-

cisco Warriors to a 122-106 victory over the Cincinnati Royals.

The total was but three shy of the Cincinnati Garden record which he owns.

Fledgling Coach Dave DeBusschere suffered his first defeat since taking over the reins of the Detroit Pistons last week as the Los Angeles Lakers rebounded from a 10-point deficit to win, 111-105.

Jerry West led the Laker effort with 36 points, while Elgin Baylor contributed 22. Player-Coach DeBusschere paced the Pistons with 28 points.

The victory, which was the 10th in 14 games for the Lakers, cemented their first place lead in the Western Division of the NBA.
