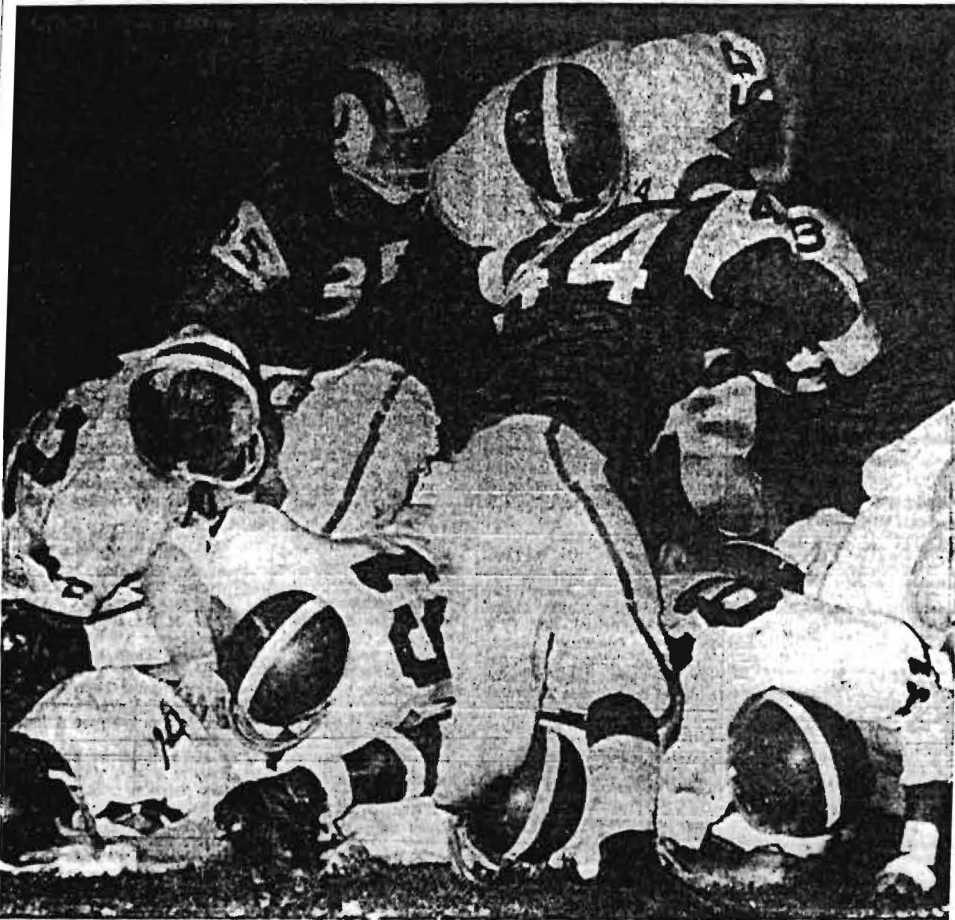


9,000 Fans See Neshaminy Edge Central Dauphin, 7-0

New Stands Do Job Well

Neshaminy High opened its season on a successful note with a victory and the new Playwick Stadium stands were approved by the spectators.

Both the new concrete stands, the West side which seats 4,000 and the East side with 3,000 were practically filled with plenty of elbow room for the spectators.

The two smaller steel-tiered stands, one on the North and the other on the South next to the new concrete structure on the west side, were about half full.

Eagles-Giants In Pre-Season Final

PRINCETON — The Philadelphia Eagles and the New York Giants come to the end of the pre-season trail today in Princeton's Palmer Stadium. Kickoff time is 2:05 p.m. and the game will be broadcast over Radio Station WCAU and the Eagles' network.

The game will also be shown on television via tape Channel 9 will telecast it tonight at 6, while Channel 10 will run the game tomorrow at noon.

The Eagles, after losing their first two exhibition outings, have snapped back to win the next two, defeating Washington, 41-13, and last Saturday night beating the Minnesota Vikings, 34-27. In last season's pre-season game between the Giants and the Eagles, the New Yorkers came on top with a 27-10 triumph.

Many of the fans preferred to stand along the fence bordering the field and formed a solid line along both sides and at the north end. An estimated 9,000 attended and left room for several additional thousands.

Bob Baxter, classy Redskin fullback who pitched 191 points last year, wears a new number this season. After touting No. 61 the senior is now No. 50.

Dr. Gerald Ellinger, team physician for the Neshaminy grid squad, couldn't attend last night's game which marked the first time in many years that he wasn't on hand to administer to the needs of the Redskins.

All the linemen were not on

the playing field. Someone in the north end stands would occasionally shoot up a sky-rocket which left a trail of sparks along the upward climb before bursting.

The usual opening game "mistakes" were noticeable in Neshaminy's play in the early stages of the contest. K. didn't take coach John Petercusi and his staff long to get things corrected.

Following a rather slow start, Eric Hutchinson broke through for a 35-yard run in the second period which seemed to spark the Redskins. From then on it was mostly all Neshaminy as they opened up and took charge.

Guard Don Fleisher and tackle

Don Green were the two main Ram tacklers with the former getting seven and the latter in on five. Backfielder Ed Dykes got in three key tackles on Redskin ballcarriers who got through Guards Bill Pettis and Wayne Sebastian divided a half dozen stopping tackles.

Linemen who stood out for Neshaminy on the defense included tackles Ray Jenkins and Fred Tragemann and guard Keenan Mucklow. The trio divided 15 tackles evenly.

The clever Dauphin ballcarriers filtered through quite often but were challenged successfully by Redskin backfield men. Jim Walker showed the way with a half dozen tackles. Bob Baxter won in four classy grabs while Ted Boerckel and Jack Dunn each had three good stoppers.

Bill Brundzo Scores Lone TD Of Game

Now even folks out in Harrisburg have felt Neshaminy's football muscle.

The Redskins last night launched a brand new rivalry — and the 1963 campaign — by defeating Central Pennsylvania power Central Dauphin, 7-0, before 9,000 fans at Playwick Field.

It was only the second loss in the past 21 games for Central Dauphin, and the Rams' first shutout in several seasons.

Halfback Bill Brundzo and fullback Bob Baxter collaborated for Neshaminy's scoring although junior newcomer Eric Hutchinson stole the glow from the BB boys during the TD march.

Brundzo scored the game's only touchdown by plowing into the end zone from one yard out with 5:44 remaining in the first half. It climaxed a 79-yard advance in 16 plays, after which Baxter promptly booted the extra point.

Hutchinson Comes Through
Most sizable gain during the productive drive was Hutchinson's 35-yard scamper from Neshaminy's 19 to the Central Dauphin 46 on a crucial third-down-and-12 situation.

Neshaminy had taken possession at its 21 following a punt but two plays lost one yard apiece. Then Hutchinson took a handoff and highlighted it around the right side en route to his 35-yard pickup, the game's longest gain.

Naturally, it provided a tremendous boost for the Redskins who couldn't rely seem to get things started until then.

Once Neshaminy had gotten its offensive lift from Hutchinson's 35-yard pickup around the right side, the ball-toting chores were also shared by Brundzo, Baxter and Jack Dunn.

Each took his turn as the Redskins, using their stereotyped single-wing offense, picked up short yardage en route to paydirt.

Dunn and Baxter both picked up vital yardage when Neshaminy was faced with a fourth down.

situation deep in Central Dauphin territory.

Dunn dived over the middle of the line to gain three yards to the 11 when the first "must" situation occurred, then Baxter later bulldozed for two yards to the one to set up Brundzo's TD.

Rams Threaten Twice
Central Dauphin, meanwhile flustered with a touchdown at least twice.

The first serious threat came late in the first half when quarterback Dave Kelly's pass from the Neshaminy 35 barely overshot halfback Cal Nunnally's fingertips. There was no stopping Nunnally had he been able to reach it.

The other threat by the Harrisburg eleven came early in the fourth quarter when a 13-play movement on the ground took the Rams from their own 24 to the Neshaminy 13 before the drive stalled at the 15.

During that final penetration, Kelly was back to pass at Neshaminy's 36 and appeared trapped for a sizable loss. However, he wriggled his way out of the jam and wound up gaining 15 yards before Brundzo — the last defender — pushed him out of bounds.

Redskins Threaten
Neshaminy's only other serious scoring threat occurred late in the last quarter. The Redskins halted Central Dauphin's farthest penetration, took over at the 15 and in 17 plays had gotten as far as the Rams' 10 when the game ended.

Actually, Central Dauphin didn't have the ball long in the second half. The Rams were only able to work two offensive series because Neshaminy's short-gain ground game ate up most of the time.

Although Nunnally and fullback Dave Curran ran well in Central Dauphin's "Delaware Wing T" offense, quarterback Kelly was indeed the quarter back for the Redskins' defense to rope with.
