

Neshaminy Defeats Dieruff

Redskins Convert Fumble Into TD In 13-7 Thriller

Neshaminy High School again benched statistics by taking advantage of a fumble which was converted into a touchdown and one lone thrust for a 70-yard score in the first half then staved off visiting Allentown Dieruff to win a 13-7 thriller.

It was another victory for the home Redskins of coach John Petercusi in the East Penn Football League to raise their mark to 3-0 and an overall record of 5-0-1. Dieruff is now 0-2

way in the first quarter when Dieruff fumbled a handoff on its 31. The ball was touched by several players on both teams. It bounced past the left end of Neshaminy to set-up a "linesman's dream" play in the clear for tackle Schwartz to pick-up and run 29 yards unmolested for the TD. A Baxter pass to Bill Brundzo made it 7-0.

Then in the second period with only a minute left in the half, after Neshaminy moved the oval from its 14 to the 30 in four plays, lightning struck — in the person of Baxter who took a punt around left end behind splendid interference then broke through for a 70-yard scamper along the sideline to paydirt and a big, big 13-0 lead. Baxter's attempt on a placement was wide.

Late in the third stanza Huskie coach Ernest Wescoe's boys took to the air to get moving. With only 7:15 of the period left the visitors were on the Redskin 8 after coming from midfield in three first downs due to three completed passes of 10, 26 and 10.

Expecting another pass, the defenders let Ken Reichard cut over from the 8 on a line buck. Then when Chris Yanzner went back to pass for the extra point, his receivers were covered but he cleverly skirted to his right and just reached the goal line for the point to make it 13-7.

Others in the Redskin lineup who played a good defensive game were Boerckel and Mucklow (coach in four outstanding tackles), Dunn, Brundzo, Clarke, John Zanni and Bill McIntire.

Pitetti Scores 3 TDs As Delhaas Whips Morrisville

Paul Pitetti scored three touchdowns, kicked one extra point and passed for another PAT last night to lead Delhaas to a 26-0 victory over Morrisville in a Lower Bucks County Football League, Section Two contest at the loser's field.

Pitetti tallied his markers on an 11 yard pass from John Rugg, a three yard plunge and a four yard run. The 19 points give the 185 pound senior a total of 43 for the season, putting him in second place in the league's scoring race.

The Tigers controlled the game completely until the final few minutes when Delhaas coach, Stan Lejinski, threw in his third string. Morrisville did not mark up a first down until midway through the third period which was also the first time in the contest that the Bulldogs were able to cross the 30 yard stripe.

Third In Row

The victory was the third in a row for the Tigers, one of their longest winning streaks in recent years. They defeated Bristol last week and knocked over Pemberton (N.J.) the week before that. The win also puts Delhaas in first place in the Section Two standings with a 2-0 record.

The first Tiger tally came at mast at the end of the first period after the two squads had exchanged punts when their drives failed to pick up enough ground. Morrisville kicked from its own goal line to give the Tigers the ball on the Bulldog 30 yard line.

ed with a short pass brought Delhaas to the Morrisville 11 yard stripe. It was here that Rugg hit Pitetti with a flat pass and the rugged back raced into the end zone with his first six-punter of the evening.

Pitetti shared scoring honors in the second frame with Rugg. Pitetti scored first on a three yard plunge set up by a well executed keeper play in which Rugg moved the ball 24 yards.

Rugg got into the scoring act himself shortly afterward when he ran to paydirt from the 15 yard line.

Pitetti Scores Third — The final Delhaas marker came in the third frame after the Tigers took a Morrisville kick and marched 57 yards for the TD. Pitetti carried the last four yards to add six more points to his collection.

Pitetti crossed the goal line again in the fourth period on a 23 yard scamper but the TD was nullified when the officials called a clipping penalty against the Tigers.

U.S. Rejuggles Ryder Cup Team
