PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — The presence of the 1950 Whiz Kids sent the Philadelphia Phillies into sentimental fits last night as the current edition of the team rapped out 14 hits to smash the St. Louis Cardinals, 6-0.

A crowd of 35,621 turned out as rookie Ray Culp won his seventh game against three losses. Culp threw a three-hitter, allowing only one hit until two out in the ninth inning.

A three inning contest between the pennant winning Whiz Kids and the '63 Phillies preceded the regular game.

Curt Simmons, a former Whiz Kid, took the loss, only the second at the hands of the Phils in 13 decisions since he joined the Cards following his release from the Phillies in 1960.

Culp, a \$100,000 bonus investment four years ago, aided his own cause with a single in the third in which the Phils scored twice.

Tony Gonzalez belted his first homer to open the sixth and the Phils added three in the seventh on a bases-loaded single and a double.

The Whizzers lost the three-inning game 3-1, their lone run coming on Andy Seminick's homer in the second inning off Al Widmar, now a pitching coach. Jim Konstanty gave the fans a thrill by arriving in a helicopter to relieve for the Whiz Kids in the final inning.
