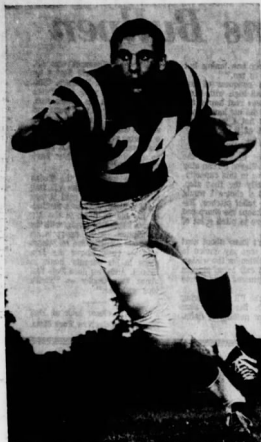

# Local College Gridders To Follow Schuh's Steps?

Harry Schuh has set a precedent for all Lower Bucks County High School gridders.

The former Neshaminy star became the county's first All-American two years ago while playing offensive tackle at Memphis State. Now he is Lower Bucks' latest player in the professional ranks, demonstrating his talents with the Oakland Raiders of the American Football League.

Will Lower Bucks ever produce another All-American or professional player? That is the question that only time and God will tell.

But many former high

school standouts have gone on to play college ball and dot the rosters of teams all over the country.

At the top are John Carber at Army, Bob Baxter at Memphis State, Charles Mudie at Rutgers, Bill Creedon at Penn, Jack Stricker at Temple and Jeff Traub at Bucknell.

Carber, a senior at West Point, has been mentioned for All-East honors. The former Neshaminy lineman starts on defense at the tackle slot and just last week proved to be a problem to another local gridder.

**Half-Running Back**

Mudie, a hard-running halfback at Rutgers, found running against Army on Saturday was no easy task. The college junior from Bensalem was reminded of the old battles between the 'Skins and the Owls.

Baxter joined the Memphis State varsity squad for the first time this year and is doing well along with fellow sophomore Bill Brundzo, another halfback. Both players were reunited with linebacker Herb Cummings, who was a senior at Neshaminy when the other two were soph.

The versatility of Jack Stricker, a former hard-running back at Neshaminy, enabled his Temple coach George Makris to move him to defensive back recently to plug up one of the Owls' biggest holes.

Joining Stricker in Temple's starting lineup is guard Dave Frederick, a sophomore who played for Egan.

Ex-Bishop Egan quarterback, Bill Creedon has found denting the University of Penn's lineup a tough task as a sophomore but the Quakers have great expectations and hopes for the young passer in its rebuilding ways.

**Other Quakers**

Two other sophomores are seeing action for the Quakers, Bill Houser at end from Pennsylvania and guard Joe Frazer, formerly of Bishop Egan.

Last week Traub led his Bucknell team into Franklin Field to face the Quakers but his efforts couldn't keep the Bison's from losing in the last seconds. The former Council Rock center is Bucknell's captain and this week will lead his squad against Lafayette where he will battle former Council Rock halfback Bill Messick.

Messick has done well for the Leopards and scored a touchdown against Columbia.

Other starters from the area (all guards) include Bruce Shallicross of Richboro on defense for Susquehanna, Don Steinbacher of Holland on offense guard for Penn State, and John Wichelman of Neshaminy at Tennessee Tech.

**Knee Injury**

Ed Michael, ex-Neshaminy lineman, was slated to see a lot of duty at Lehigh but the junior guard injured his knee in pre-season workouts and will have to sit out a year.

Bill Drueding, a former Bensalem standout, sees a lot of action for the Delaware squad at defensive end.

Vlanova c'aims three area football players in sophomores Dallas Webb of Tennent and Joe Nolan of Egan last season's top freshman player. Webb is found at end and Nol-

an at tackle, joining junior tackle Charles Ahrens, another ex-Egan performer.

**Kule At Yale**

Another ex-Egan gridder is found at Yale in the likes of halfback Chris Kule.

Small college players include tackle Cole Piper (Pennsylvania) at Maryville College, backs Otis Johnson (Bristol), Joe Lowe (Pennsylvania) and guard Ray Zindell (Tennent) and at Bloomsburg State College, end Bob Pascale (Bristol), at Juniata, Jerry Zwertzig (Tennent) at Albright.

Also Pete Lee (Delhaas), Glen Ray (Bensalem), and Dave Yates (Pennsylvania) at East Stroudsburg, and Vince Tanzola (Pennsylvania) at Delaware Valley College.

Freshman gridgers include Dennis Woomer (Pennsylvania) at Penn State, Dennis Hough (Neshaminy) and Larry Krause (Tennent) at Juniata, John Duffy (Egan) and Gregg Thompson (Wilson) at Delaware Valley College, Vince Trapani (Pennsylvania) at Haverford, and Ken Homa (Pennsylvania) and Pete Royal (Wilson) at Duke.

Perhaps one of these may not become another Harry Schuh, but all will surely represent Lower Bucks football to the best of his ability and someday, somewhere another Harry Schuh will probably emerge.
