

Buchinski Edges Colbert In AP All-State Poll At Quarterback

HARRISBURG (AP) — Pennsylvania's 1965 schoolboy scoring champ, a quarterback with 27 touchdown passes and a giant 250-pound tackle were named today to The Associated Press All-State scholastic football team.

The first three teams also feature a repeater from last year at end, a halfback who followed in the footsteps of his brother and another quarterback who set a national record for touchdown passes.

So close was the balloting of the 150 sportswriters, sportscasters and coaches that five players were named to the first team backfield, marking one of the tightest races in the 27-year history of all-state teams in Pennsylvania.

Joe Buchinski of Mount Carmel won quarterback honors,

his credentials rating him as one of the state's top passers with 27 touchdown tosses and 1,924 yards in passing yardage.

Joining him in the backfield are Art "Buster" Ray of Harrisburg Harris, who scored 202 points in 19 games to rank among Pennsylvania's all-time scoring champs; Ray Gillian of Uniontown; Terry Rettig of Butler and Wesley Garnett of Pittsburgh Westinghouse.

Big Mike McCoy of Erie Cathedral Prep, a 6-foot-4, 250-pound tackle, anchors the first team line, which also features Rich Saul, Butler, and Ron Whitfield, Ridley Twp., at the ends; Jeff Mapstone, Lock Haven, and Dave Mancuso, Monongahela, at the guards; Fred Sample, Churchill Area, at center and John Ebersole, Altoona, at the other tackle spot.

Buchinski edged out Jim Colbert of Neshaminy and Joe Emmi of Ridley Twp. in a three-way race for quarterback honors.

Emmi fired 34 touchdown passes for Ridley, shattering what was believed to be the national schoolboy record of 30 set in 1955 by Doyle Taylor of Temple, Tex.

Favorite target during the season was Whitfield, who alluded to his 5-foot-10 and 160 pounds, grabbed 16 TD tosses and added another on a punt return to set a new state scoring record for linemen.

Colbert, the no. 2 quarterback, is the runner in the trio, accounting for more than 1,000 yards on the ground this year at Neshaminy.

Saul, 6-foot-3, 212-pound senior, whose brother Bill starred at

Penn State and performed with the Baltimore Colts and the Pittsburgh Steeler of the National Football League, is the only repeater from last year's first team.

Although catching only 18 passes for 215 yards during the season, Rich was a standout on defense and handled Butler punting in helping the Tornados to the playoffs of the WPIAL-Class AA race.

Ironically, Saul and Mancuso have twin brothers playing football, too.

Garnett is the speedster of the AP backfield, clocked at 9.8 seconds for 100 yards. His 26 touchdowns and six TD passes led

Westinghouse to an undefeated season this year and the Pittsburgh City League championship.

Rettig and Gillian both rushed for more than 1,000 yards and accounted for 73 and 78 points respectively. It was Gillian who scored the winning touchdown in Uniontown's 147 victory over Butler in the WPIAL-Class AA playoff game.

Rettig, who followed by two years his brother's section to the AP backfield, set two new records at Butler this year with his 1,174 yards gained for the season and his overall career rushing total of 2,137. Both records previously were held by brother Bill, now with Penn State.

'Giants' Pace Rams

If there were any doubts about Woodrow Wilson being a strong choice to defend its Lower Bucks County League basketball title, it can be forgotten.

Playing probably the worst game they'll play all year, the Rams romped to an easy 20-point victory without an offense.

A small Spring-Ford squad came to town and couldn't cope with the gigantic size of a battling Wilson team and went

home with a 59-39 pasting last night in the opening game of the season.

It was a typical first game—marked most of the time by sloppy ball playing, in fact there were so many "tackles" many thought they were at an indoor football contest.

But winning coach Gene Massari should have little worries. Using a strong defense and rebounding the Rams completely dominated the play.

Game Plan
Massari stated, "We knew

we'd have to win on defense and rebounding because our players just haven't worked to become as air-tight as a submarine, the Rams limited the visiting Fords to just eight points in the first half, three in the second period.

Meanwhile 6-5 Ron Urban and 6-5 Bill Kennedy were crashing the boards and the home team held a 31-8 advantage at halftime.

After falling behind, 3-1, a bucket by Nick Leonard and a layup by Kennedy put the Rams ahead for good with 4:50 left in the first quarter. The visitors then got only one basket in the next 11 minutes.

Substitutes Freely
During the first half when even 5-9 Denny Arick was blocking shots, Spring-Ford must have thought they were playing an entire team of Wilt Chamberlains.

The easy verdict enabled Massari to substitute freely so no offense was ever really set up. The Rams just used their height advantage to put in the baskets. Spring-Ford managed to put in 17 points in the final period to make the score somewhat respectable.

Leonard topped the scoring with 13 counters followed by Arick, who seemed to make the team move better after being inserted early in the game, and Kennedy with 11, and Urban with 10.

Urban and Kennedy both pulled down 11 rebounds with reserve Paul Harris getting seven, John Little six, and Leonard five. All told the Rams had 51, only eight less than their point total.

Massari has no problem off the boards or on defense and figures his offense will come around in time. When it does, Lower Bucks foes had better beware.
