The Yankees beat the Detroit Tigers in the 14th inning, thus clinching the American League pennant and the right to face the St. Louis Cardinals in the World Series. Bill Dickey drove in the winning run and Spud Chandler picked up the pitching victory. . . Muhlenberg football coach Al (Doggie) Julian was the speaker at the Varsity A Alumni Club's first Monday morning quarterback meeting. He talked about the academic routine of the football players at Muhlenberg and other Navy V-12 and Marine training schools.

Easton's Bobby Rute scored a touchdown for Duke in the Blue Devils 61-0 rout of Richmond . . . Harrison-Morton Coach Ken Wildonger was looking over a "green" team on the first day of practice. Some of the candidates were Tommy Jackson of the great Jackson family, John Tighe, George Montz, Tony Bucha, Joe Cassiotti, Bill Adams, Bill Klimek, Bill Cassium, Roger Williams and Jim Elwood . . . A capacity crowd of 65,000 was expected to watch Pitt battle Notre Dame, a team featuring All-America Angelo Bertelli.

Third baseman George Kejl was the hitting star for the Red Roses . . . The Philadelphia A's lost their 100th game, a 7-6 setback by the Browns.

The Allentown Canaries whipped McAdoo, 38-6, before 7,000 at Jack Coffield Stadium. Bob Harr, Ray Dini, Harry Hartman and Billy Kline were the standouts . . . Other early-season football action saw Bethlehem whip Scranton Tech, 33-0, as Jim Schwartz and Bill Walsh each scored a pair of touchdowns. . . Muhlenberg won its first game of the season, 13-0, over the Battling Blimps of Lakehurst Naval Station. Dave Griffith and Bob Haldeman scored the Muhlenberg TDs . . . NESHAMINY — Neshaminy bunched a safety and a touchdown into 51 seconds of the second quarter Friday night and kept its unbeaten string in tact with a 14-9 win over Easton.

About 9,000 partisan fans saw the Redskins gain their third victory of the season against one tie while sending Easton down to its first loss. The Red Rovers have won one.

The eight-point second-period effort brought Neshaminy from a 7-6 deficit, and then the Bucks County powerhouse had to give up two points in the third period to preserve the win.

The safety, which gave the Redskins an 8-7 edge, came when Easton's Karl Bell was trapped in his own endzone after a pass from center on a punt attempt went over his head.

The Red Rovers kicked off from their 20, and before they knew it, Neshaminy had scored again. Speedy halfback Bob Baxter took the ball on his 49 on the first play from scrimmage and scampered 51 yards for the clinching touchdown. That came with 10:12 left in the first half.

Easton got its chance in the third quarter after putting Neshaminy in the hole following a punt. On a third-and-seven situation on the Redskins nine, a fumble in the backfield sent the ball toward the endzone. Three Easton players had a shot at it, but Neshaminy lineman John Troyano pounced on it and the Rovers had to settle for a safety.

Coach Bobby Rute's Easton club took a 7-0 leading in the early minutes of the game when it recovered a Neshaminy fumble on the opening kickoff on the Redskins 25. Five plays later, Chuck Amato bucked over from the three. Joe Glory added the extra point.
