Dieruff showed little regard last night for Neshaminy's glowing press clippings. The Huskies outplayed the Bucks County club for all but 5½ minutes and handed the Redskins their first blemish of the season — a 6-6 tie in ASD Stadium.

A disappointing crowd of 2,803 (paid) saw Coach Ernie Wescoe's club make up in desire what it lacked in size and experience, rolling up 286 yards on the ground in its best effort of the campaign. Only a couple of crucial fumbles kept the East Siders from poeasting a major scholastic upset. Neshaminy, which had won four straight games — all convincingly — moved 63 yards in 11 plays with the opening kickoff for its lone touchdown. Ted Kaminski, a senior 160-pounder, smashed off tackle from the

2 for the score. He piled up 51 yards on eight carries in the march. But from there on out, it was all Dieruff, as the Redskins were forced to punt four times and moved into Dieruff territory only once. The Huskies defense, spearheaded by linebacker Jerry Ruccio, held Neshaminy to 154 yards on the ground and 20 in the air. Neshaminy received a severe setback on the opening play from scrimmage when junior quarterback Jim Colbert, who has engineered the four pre-

vious wins, was racked up on a keeper play. He was admitted to Allentown Hospital for observation, suffering possible head injuries.
Now 2-1-2
Dieruff, which is now 2-1-2 for the season, never looked better than last night, with Jim Davis and George Daskalakes putting on a strong running show. Davis, a 220-pound junior fullback, ran for 11 yards on 22 carries, while Daskalakes, a 184-pound cocaptain, rushed for 103 yards on 17 attempts.

Muhlenberg appeared driving for a tying TD with the ensuing kickoff, moving from its won 20 to the PMC 10, only to be stopped on downs when a fourth-down pass lost 12 yards. PMC had two field goal attempts — from the 20 and 35—
