

# South Edges North In Bucks All-Star Grid Classic, 13-12

While other high school seniors in Bucks County are no doubt thinking about the summer and what lies ahead, the All-Star members of the North and South grid teams are in the knocking heads and playing their hearts out in the annual Bucks County All-Star football game.

This year's 16th edition held Saturday evening at Central Bucks West's War Memorial Stadium was no exception as the intensity and pride factor in the game continues to grow. The first half saw the South squad end a three-year drought and take home a 13-12 victory, only the fourth South win in the history of the benefit fundraiser.

"It was a good defensive game," said Penridge head football coach Frank Kryzaniak who was one of the estimated 2,300 in attendance at the grid classic. "It's a shame someone has to lose," commented the Ram coach. Although the game seemed to be dominated by defense Kryzaniak felt the offensive squads did well considering they only had 42 weeks of practice to prepare for the game.

The North squad drew first blood in the opening quarter when the team moved 67 yards in their first possession. After a 21-yard punt by the South squad, William Tennent's signal caller Kevin Crapper went three-for-three on a 10-play drive hitting George Rocchino with a 12 yard gain and Penridge's Peter Hollingsworth (North's leading receiver, 3 for 31) with a 14-yard reception before connecting with Quakeron's wide receiver Rick Stetch on a square-out at the South 30. Stetch then made a move on three South defenders and scampered past them for a score.

The point after attempt by Mark Harstett of Central Bucks West was blocked and the North held a 6-0 lead with 5:30 to go in the first quarter.

On the next possession the South squad drove 61 yards in 11 plays, spearheaded by the throwing of Bensalem's quarterback Scott Ashman and the bruising running of Harry S. Truman's Derrick Williams. Ashman, who played the entire game for the South squad, was two-for-three passes for 21 yards in the drive. The main drive of the South's offense on this drive and most of the game however, was Williams who carried 10 rushes for 21 yards and went over from the far with 1:22 left in the first quarter.

The North squad bounced right back with some good inside running by Penridge running back Tim Meyer to take a 12-7 lead following the kickoff by South.

Central Bucks West signal caller Gary Nolan drew the locals down the field in 12 plays covering 58 yards to resume the lead.

## Blazer Pitcher Honored

Quakertown Blazer pitcher John Johnston was named one of the top candidates for the Atlantic Collegiate Baseball League's Player of the Week award.

Meyer, who lead the North squad in rushing, carried the ball six times for 41 yards in the scoring drive. Nolan drove in for the score from the two-yard line with 9:26 left in the quarter. The North Squad, coached by Mark Collins of William Tennent, elected to try for the two-point conversion which failed when C.B. West's Darrell Garner was pulled down short of North leading by five points, 12-7.

The South took the opening kick off of the second half and drove 76 yards in 13 plays to score what was to be the winning tally.

"You've got to give a lot of credit

to their offensive people," said head coach Collins. The South drive featured a critical third and five play that went for 31 yards on a Asman pass to Bishop Egan's Jim Schurr, who caught the ball on his own 40 and carried it to the North 29 yard line before being brought down.

Running back Williams then carried on five of the last six plays, again scoring from the four with 1:14 left in the third quarter.

It was here that the intensity of the game was magnified as both benches cleared in an apparent brawl after quarterback Asman of South was pulled down during a two-point conversion try and Penridge

defensive nose guard Joe Loburak was called for piling on. The two squads emptied onto the field in the end, but the South had regained the lead for good, holding the North squad to just 32 yards of offense in the third stanza.

The North had two excellent opportunities to score in the fourth quarter but was turned away by an enthusiastic South defense.

North quarterback Capor drove his squad from their own 20 to the South 12 with 9:36 left to play, but a second touchdown passed to Stetch was intercepted by Council Rock's John McGrath and the scoring drive was thwarted.

With 5:23 left in the ball game a Harstett field goal attempt went every other the North team had moved the ball to the South 24.

The South squad then turned the ball-carrying duties over to Williams who handled the ball on nine-out-of-ten of their final plays. The clock ran out on the North squad as the South garnered four first downs during the game-ending march to the three yard line of the North.

In addition to Rams Pete Hollingsworth, Tim Meyer and Joe Loburak local representation on the North team included defensive back

Louis Riddick who had several touchdowns-saving tackles and was credited with knocking a number of passes out of harm's way. Kent Weidenmeyer who did an excellent job at the offensive guard position and Jim Adams at offensive center.

Randy Fred of Penridge was also selected to play in the All-Star contest but was unable to participate in the game after suffering a broken leg in an unrelated three-on-one accident just days before practice was to begin.
