9,000 at Harry Franks Stadium The heroes were the usual ones. Quarterback Randy Cuthbert scored two touchdowns and threw for one

Wingback Anthony Ventresca scored on a 79-yard screen pass and had a beautiful 58-yard run as the Bucks rolled up 361 yards total offense. Kicker Chris Angell added a 33-yard

field goal and two PATs. But the story last night was West's defense, which limited Neshaminy's high-powered offense to 135 yards

total and nothing from the air. Defensively, that was one of the best games we've ever played," said West coach Mike Pettine, "And what keyed that was the offense. We got up early and we were able to dictate to

them a little." What started out to be a serious threat to C.B. West's monumental winning streak soon turned into a familiar pattern of Bucks domina-

Neshaminy's wishbone offense which many said would be no threat to the West defense, surprised even the most partisan fan by ripping the Bucks' middle for 61 yards on its second drive of the game, strictly on

Vergantino, who had 46 vards rushing in the second quarter, finished with just 49, as West's blitzing defense, led by linebackers Jeff Live zey and Joe Butlin, stuffed the Neshaminy quarterback before he could gather a head of steam.

West got off and running on a brilliant 79-yard first-quarter screenpass play from Cuthbert to Ventresca, West's 5-foot-10, 155-pound senior wingback nestled behind a

great wall of blockers, then scam pered away from every Neshaminy defender in pursuit to stun the over flow crowd
