Pennsbury (9-0) figured to be good. The Fa cons returned Division I types like Galen Snyder, Andy Anderson, Bob Burns, Marc Freeman, Dave Harrison, plus smaller school probables like Scott LaBrecque, Bob Filotei, Todd Ortman and others from last year's Vo. 1 team.

Neshiminy was 7-3 a year ago, its first year under coach Dick Bedesem. But he 'Skins were loaded with seniors. No p. oblem. They were also loaded with quality coaches, guys who knew how to teach winning football.

"There's a whole new attitude around here now," said Dan Weissenberg," after blocking a punt to set up one touchdown and intercepting a pass in Neshaminy's 28-0 win over Abing on last Friday night. "It's winning. We don't think about losing. Before, we'd just go and play. Now we go out to win."

It's been working. The 'Skins are 14-5 under Bedesem, who brought in a new couching staff and a new offense the Wishbone.

"People said a high school team couldn't run the Wishbone," said senior quarterback Tim Ford, "but I guess we're proving them wrong."

Bedesem's first choice for quarterback in the Bone was Mickey Ford. But Tim's older brother was injured in a scrimma: e before last year's opener, to the pressure fell on the younger son of Brian Ford, Bordentown High's referan basketball coach.

FORD OWNS a 3.75 grade average in school and might be headed to Army or Navy for college ("I'd love to day for Army, but I don't know if I van to put in five years after graduation"), but reading books is one hing, reading defenses for the Wishbone is another.

"'t's not just me," Ford said, "it's tae co ching staff. They're incredible. They prepare us so well, I don't see how-we can do wrong."

Abington, of course, is not Pennsbury, a fact that is not lost on Ford.
"We'll have to play at the top of our

game to beat them," he said. "But we've played good teams before. Playing teams like (Central Bucks) West, North Penn (Neshaminy's Josses), Norristown, Council Rock, that helped get us ready for Pennsbury.
