pass in the direction of lag-gart near the goal line. Neshaminy defensive back Gary Renson jumped in front of Taggart, intercepted the pass and raced untouched down the near sideline for a

Beck fell quiet for a moment, his thoughts stuck in the traffic jam of defeat, before continuing.

Neshaminy, which will play No. 2 seed Ridley in the semi-finals next weekend, put the game away when senior tail-back Jason Ulmer (26 rushed, 154 yards) scored one of his three rushing touchdowns from 2 yards out to make it 28-0 near the end of the third quarter.


