running game. Senior Jason Ulmer is the Redskins' leading rusher. Linemen Blair Gower (6-foot-2, 278 pounds). Dylan Waterbury (6-3, 270) and Dan Shirey (6-3, 257) make the Neshaminy running game go.

Keep an eye on. At 6-4, 240 pounds. Neshaminy tight end Paul Carrezola is hard to miss. The Division I prospect is an excellent athlete. "He's done some good things for us." Schmidt noted. He is a major target for Redskins OB Justin Kinney (15 TD passes). alone with wide receivers Kevin Steinberg and Gary Renson.

Injury report. The Knights will be without their starting quarterback, junior Justin Davey (shoulder). He will be replaced by junior Anthony Taggart.
