Pennsbury Rips Neshaminy, 34-0

Paris (Pal) Allison flicked a few ashes from his cigar right onto his blue, turtleneck sweater.

The guy was actually smiling. But that's just the Neshaminy head football coach's style.

Even after yesterday's blistering 34-0 loss to Pennsbury before a home cowd of 5,000, Allison attempted to look at the positive side of the game.

"Well, at least we won half the championship," Allison said, referring to the Section One Divisin of the Lower Bucks County League. "And that's better than none."

For Chuck Kane, the Pennsbury coach, the victory represented the Falcons' "best team effort," he said.

"This is the way we played football early in the season," Kane said. "Then, I guess we just slumped ...

maybe, that's tre best way to put it." The victory also earned Pennsbury

a share of the Lower Bucks County title and Kane expressed the sentiments as Allison.

"I'd rathe have a piece if it, then none of it," Kane said. "But, fankly, I thought it would be a much closer game."

The game, indeed, figured as a toss-up but, with six minutes remaining, Neshaminy's stands were nearly empty.

PPennsbury played its usual grindit-out kind of game with Jules Schiatti bulling his way for 55 yards in 18 carries, including a couple of touchdowns, while Chris Klein h ad 65 yards in 14 trips.

And when Klein and Sghiatti weren't crunching up the middle, quarterback Steve Gross accounted fo another 117 yards, completing seven of 15 passes.

Neshaminy was stymied on both the ground and its passing attack was stopped cold.

"It was a typical Pennsbury defense," Allison said, shrugging. "Sure, a lot of our passes we re dropped . . but they were putting a lot of pressure on us, too." Terry Gallagher, Neshaminy's

Terry Gallagher, Neshaminy's hard-throwing quarterback, completed only two of 15 passes fo 18 yards and was sacked for 42 yards by defensive ends Bud Reichard and Bill Connel.

"Billy played an exceptional game," Kane said. "And Bud? Well, re just played his usual, gutty game."

Down by 6-0, the most controversial play of the game came when Neshaminy reached Pennsbury's 22 early in the second period. The drive stalled there and Neshaminy was faced with a fourth an dsixth situation.

Allison elected to try for a field goal and Jeff Ratner's 41-yard boot

w as true. However, on the play, Pennsbury was flagged on an offsides and Allison decided to take the thee points off the board.

"I thought the penalty had given us a first down," Allison said. "No, if I had the same thing to do over, I do it again."

Kane didn't agree but refused to comment on Allison's decision.

"I'll just say that George Allen's (coach of the Washington Redskins) philosophy is to never take points off the board," Kane said. "And I respect that man's philosophy."

Tom Fleisch also intercepted a Gallagher pass and recovered a fumble. Two other Nashaminy fumbles were gobbled up by Joe Marrazzo and John Egan.

'It's all over," Allison said, sighing. "You play 10 games and then you play Pennsbury. That's just the way the season goes."
