Falcons get off to fast start to earn a share of title

Neshaminy had nothing to lose but the game. And Pennsbury saw to that.

Neshaminy came into its game against Pennsbury on Saturday with nothing to lose, while the Falcons were playing for a share of the Suburban. One National Conference championship.

The Falcons quickly squelched any thoughts the Redskins may have had of playing spoiler, surging to a 29-6 first-quarter lead on their way to a 27-8 victory over their Saburban One rivals.

The win improved the Falcons' league record to 84, 83 overall, and left them tied for the championship with Central Bucks West, which beat Central Bucks East, 35-7, Neshaminy fell to 2-7 in the Suburban One National, 3-7 overall.

"It feels great to be champs," Faicons coach Larry Greene said, "because the kids worked hard and got the job done when a lot of people said they couldn' do it. We are one of the smallest teams in the jeague, and we're not loaded with super taient, but they'll go out and scrap with anyone."

Pennbury took control of the game early. Neshaniny was stopped on three plays in their first series, and a bad stang forced senior punter Arnie Gooch to rum with the ball. He was stopped way short of a first down, and Pennsbury took over at the Redskins? Adyard line. The Falcons' senior quarterback, Matt Reder, ran it in from 1 yard out for the first of his two touchdowns and a 74 Pennsbury lead.

The Falcons stopped Neshaminy again on three plays, and their next possession began at the Redskins 41. This time they went to the air for the touchdown, the acore coming on a 25yard pass from Rader to sophomore split end Ryan Matheson. The 64ost, 5-inch Rader finished with 11 complotions in 17 attempts for 151 yards.

Things actually got worse for the Rodskins. When Neshaminy senior quarterback Joe Mormello's fumble was recovered by Falcosis junior defensive end Rick Dittman, Pennsbury again had great field position at the Rodskins' 3J. When Rader ran it in from 2 yards out. the Falcosn had a 200 lead with 159 still remaining the the optiming quarter.

"Coming in, I thought we'd match up well with them and be able to move the ball against their defense," said Redskins coach Dick Bedesem. "Obviously, it's not just one problem, but a lot of things we're going to have to look at after the season."

Greene credited the Redskins for not giving up, and it is to Neshaminy's credit that it did not roll over and die after digging itself the early hole. The Redskins moved the bail much more effectively in the second quarter, but could not put any points

on the board. Then, just before halftime, the Falcons struck the killing blow.

After the Redskins loar the hall on downa, Pennshwry took ver at its own 49-yard line with 4 minutes, 10 seconds left in the hall. It loades like the drive would stall when the Falcons called their last mixeout at the Redskins 19-yard line with 8 seconds left. But Rader lofted a perfect pass to tophomore split end Janon Cooper in the back corner of the end zone on the last play to give the Falcons an insurmountable 270 lead.

The Redskins avoided the shutout when Mormello ran for a one-yard touchdown with 11 seconds remaining in the game. Sentor Bill Borman's conversion ran accounted for the final score. "I am very proud of this team, They're very close and hey work hard," Greene said.
