

Tryens, Hallowell, Daenz Win Weekly Grid Honors

The weekly honors given by the Courier Times were chosen from an action-packed 10-game schedule on the weekend past. The teams once again did a whole heap of pointmaking, as 340 markers were chalked up, despite five shutouts.

Three Lower Bucks County League contests were held, a pair in Section Two and the other a Section One tilt. In the latter the high flying Pennsbury Falcons (6-2) butted the Woodrow Wilson Rams (1-7-1), 40-7.

The 'upset of the week' came in Section Two as Lower Moreland's Lions mauled the Bensalem eleven, combined with Bristol's 32-21 come-from-behind victory over upstart Council Rock, brought about a dealock for first place in the section.

The duo of Philadelphia Catholic League games involving area teams were both easy shutout victories. Bishop Egan, the area's top array of gridders crushed Bishop Kenrick of Norristown, 34-0, while Archbishop Wood was humbled by LaSalle, 40-0.

The only other game that was concerned with any league standings was the George School's 26-0 victory over Pennington School, which permits the Cougars to retain the top spot in the Penn-Jersey Conference by one half game over the Hun School of Princeton.

William Tennent rolled over Norristown's Eisenhower High, 27-0, and Neshaminy dumped Bishop McDevitt of Harrisburg,

27-6. In two other non-league encounters Jenkintown dropped its eighth game of the season, 21-19, to Bishop Shanahan and North Burlington topped Morrisville, 14-6.

GAME OF THE WEEK — No doubt about it!

This has to be the big Section Two upset. Lower Moreland, which had previously beaten only league doormat Jenkintown, came out at full strength and swamped league leading Bensalem, 20-0, dropping the Owls into a tie with Bristol for first place.

the week' as a natural. Lower Moreland coach Andy Tryens has had a trying time this season after capturing the Section Two crown a year ago.

Andy had his aggregation "up" for Saturday's battle with the front-running eleven and his team was healthy for the first time this year and they went out and pulled the big upset.

PLAY OF THE WEEK — There were quite a few plays in the running for this honor, but the near-unanimous selection of the sports staff was the unusual beginning of the Bristol-Council Rock contest, that had the visiting Indians ahead 7-0 before

the clock started to run.

The Indians kicked off to Bristol and the Warrior deep men watch the ball roll toward the goal, guarding the oval as if it were a punt. As the ball went into the end zone the Bristol players straightened up and as they did, Jeff Kennerlye, a sophomore back, alertly pounced on the pigskin for a CR touchdown and the clock had not yet begun to tick.

LINEMAN OF THE WEEK — Here we had a tough time deciding and only after a lengthy discussion did the winner emerge. He was two-way end for the George School, Mark Hallowell. The Cougar standout was a favorite target of quarterback Sig Hersloff and caught numerous "big" passes Saturday.

While on defense Mark intercepted a pair of Pennington aeriels returning the second 42 yards for a touchdown for the Cougars.

BACK OF THE WEEK — Another highly competitive department, but the voting was almost unanimously in favor of Neshaminy's Bill Daenz. The senior halfback tallied three touchdowns in helping the rebuilding Redskins gain their third win of the campaign.

This coming Friday night there will be a trio of games to kick off an eight-game weekend slate. In a Section One battle Pennsbury travels to Langhorne to meet archrival Neshaminy. Woodrow Wilson will host Bensalem in an inter-sectional clash and Morrisville journeys to Pius X in Bangor.
