

Pennsbury, Neshaminy High On Big '6' All-League

Pennsbury High School and Neshaminy High School, Lower Bucks County's representatives in the rugged Big Six Football Conference, made deep impressions during the 1967 campaign.

The Falcons of Pennsbury, spearheaded by two-way performer Gordon Davies, Jr., landed six berths on the Big Six All-Star team in voting held by conference coaches this week.

Neshaminy, striving to return to football prominence, showed its "muscle" by placing four gridders on the Big Six honor roll.

Finished Second

Pennsbury, coached by Erle Baugher, finished second in the conference to unbeaten Eastern Area. The Falcons had a 4-1 league record and an overall record of 8-2.

Coach Pete Cordelli's Neshaminy eleven ended 1-4 in the Big Six and was 3-7 in all games.

Davies, a rock-solid 5-10, 205-pound senior, was the loop's only player to achieve first team berths on offense and defense. Davies was named to a guard slot on offense and to the middle guard position opposite the pigskin.

Shober, Evans Named

A pair of Falcons joined Davies on the offensive "dream team." Len Shober, the giant 6-4½, 240-pound senior, made it as a tackle. Bill Evans, a fullback who is 6-1 and tips the scales at 200-pounds, is the key in a backfield which boasts five players due to a tie for the quarterback's berth.

Easton's Daryl Woodring and Bethlehem Liberty's John Rabuck tied for the quarterback post.

Evans, a junior is a rough house back who slams opposing lines with the force of sledgehammer. He's the first Pennsbury back to gain more than a 1,000 yards on the turf in one season.

Haynes Selected

Neshaminy's Bruce Haynes joined Pennsbury's Shober as a first-rate tackle. Haynes is a

bruising 240-pound senior who measures 6-1.

Craig Johns of Neshaminy became a running mate with Evans. John ripped defensive lines like a high-powered drill. He's a senior who's 5-9 and 165-pounds.

Pennsbury and Neshaminy blended gridders to form three-quarters of the defensive line. Dave Billy, a stellar end, was one of the league's chief head hunters. Few backs found racing around Billy's end a pleasant jaunt. It generally ended in disaster. Billy is 6-1, 190-pounds and is a senior.

Huge Tackles

The tacklers are Pennsbury's Mark Lindenmuth (6-1, 240, senior) and Neshaminy's Tim Michaels (6-1, 210, junior). Linden-

muth and Michaels battled anyone head-to-head and usually won.

Davies filled the middle guard position.

The defensive secondary was filled partially by Pennsbury's Mike Farley (5-9½, 170, senior) and Neshaminy's Bill Daenz (5-11, 175, senior).

Offense Gems

Farley and Daenz both were offensive game who sparked on defense too. They have blazing speed and were adept at wrecking offensive patterns and covering deep receivers with shades of pro defenders.

Michaels and Daenz also received honorable mention votes in other positions. Michaels logged points as an offensive center and Daenz drew attention as an offensive back.
