

Cordelli, Davies Honored

This week will see the inaugural Lower Bucks County League contest of the young season as Bristol's Warriors travel to Jenkintown for a Section Two encounter. Two Big Six tests will be played in this neck of the woods. Allentown Allen will battle Pennsbury on the Falcons gridiron and the Neshaminy Redskins will host the Easton eleven.

Another Big Six array will clash with a LBC club when Woodrow Wilson motors to Allentown to face a powerful Di-ruff aggregation. Bensalem goes against William Tennent in an Inter-Sectional match. Lansdale Catholic meets its first of five Lower Bucks opponents when they play host to Morrisville's Bulldogs.

Council Rock travels to Norristown High, while Lower Moreland will be visited by Swathmore H.S. Bishop Egan and Archbishop Wood are slated for games with members of the Philadelphia Catholic League's Southern Division. The former will entertain St. James and the latter deploys for Roman Catholic's field, to round out the weekend card.

This past week's results had Bishop Egan run roughshod over Wilson's Rams, 42-0, while Bristol did almost the same to Yeadon, 38-0. Jenkintown gained

its initial victory since the 1965 campaign with a 19-6 decision over a green Archbishop Ryan eleven. Two other shutouts were recorded as Pennsbury fell to Altoona, 14-0, and Morrisville defeated Darby Township, 7-0.

Central Bucks rallied for a 27-6 win over Bensalem and Council Rock gave Downingtown tree TD's in dropping a 26-7 contest. Hatboro-Horsham nudged Tennent, 19-13 and Lower Moreland was bombed by Springfield (Montco), 26-7. St. Thomas More defeated Archbishop Wood's Vikings by a 28-14 score. Neshaminy looked like its old self, as it ground out a 20-12 victory over Pennridge.

Davies went both ways against a extremely hard hatting Altoona aggregation and was outstanding all the way.
