Filling out the center would be Ezan's RAY BADER and Pennsbury's JOHN HEWSON. Both impressed me on several occasions with their downfield blocking and quick starts from the snap.

In the defensive backfield we would like MARTY McMANUS and MIKE FARLEY from Pennsbury for a double safety, with Wood's JIM DULIN pulled back from his end position to help out, BOB WOLFRUM from Trennent and and BRUCE MADDEN from Neshaminy would toin Egan's GARY GRAY and Pennsbury's BOB BELLETIERE at the linebacker stots.
