Allen played a football game last night it would like to forget in a hurry. The Canaries lost, 7-6, to Neshaminy, but the score hardly tells how badly they were beaten.

The Canaries were woefully weak offensively, and the only touchdown they scored came

after a big effort from the defensive unit. It was the defense, too, that saved the Canaries from additional embarrassment as it halted the Redskins on at least four potential scoring drives.

Allen scored first before an ASD Stadium crowd of 5,100, thanks to a blocked punt by defensive end Jim Wildonger which gave the Canaries the ball at the Neshaminy 34. But the Lower Bucks County team, a power of the past now in a rebuilding stage, pushed one across in the third period.

The boxscore will show that reserve end Craig Vosburgh

won the game for Neshaminy. He's the boy who booted the extra point for the narrow scoreboard victory.

The Redskins, who evaded their mark at 22, never gave Allen a chance on offense as they kept the Canaries deep in a hole all night. Take away the blocked punt and Allen's deepest penetration into Neshaminy territory was two yards—the Canaries got as far as the Redskins' 48.

The blocked punt was a perfect play by Wildonger, a 6-3, 195-pound senior. He cracked through and batted the ball off the foot of Neshaminy kicker

Bob Reed. Wildonger's teammate, Frank Wippel picked up the ball and got it to the Redskins' 24.

Two plays later, Daryl Tollinche, bruised badly in the Pennsbury defeat a week ago, made two clever moves and raced into the clear and into the end zone. John Bariges' try for the point-after was wide.

Neshaminy, which threatened three times in the first half, got its score with 7:40 left in the third period. It came on a 19-yard pass play from Doug Mason to Bill Daenz. The scoring play was only Neshaminy's second completion of the night. The Redskins, with 240-pound

tackle Bruce Haynes paving the way, were strong on the ground. The punched the Canaries dizzy with power in the persons of Daenz, the team's leading ground-gainer; Craig Johns and Tom Pendergast.

Neshaminy collected 105 yards on the ground, with Daenz setting 97 of them, in the first half alone when the Redskins drove deep into Allen territory three times.

Allen's defense rose to the occasion each time, stopping the drives at the 28, the 14 and 8. But those drives, plus another one in the second half, gave Neshaminy all the ball control it needed.

Allen, which suffered its second straight loss to a Lower Bucks team, managed only 28 yards on the ground. The Canaries were in the red from scrimmage most of the second half, but managed to net five yards.

The Canaries' passing wasn't much better. With Neshaminy putting the heat on Kim McQuilken, the Allen quarterback completed nine of 23 attempts for 67 yards.

Twice in the first quarter Allen had to call on the defense for help. On the very first series of plays—after Neshaminy's Steve Sroba nearly ran back

the opening kickoff — the Redskins punched their way to the AHS 28 before Vic Shierbeck halted the drive.

Jim Stephens intercepted 3 Neshaminy pass minutes after the Redskins had another drive under way. He kicked it off in the end zone, erasing a march that carried Neshaminy to the Allen 14.

Early in the second quarter, another gallant effort by Allen's defense prevented a touchdown. After Daenz cut loose with a 54-yard gain, Neshaminy got to the Allen 8. But two running plays failed, then Scott Mair knocked down a pass at the goal line.

THIRD Nats Eliminate White Sox On Unearned Run in 1st, 1-0

CHICAGO (AP) — The Washington Senators ousted Chicago from the American League pennant race Friday night by nipping the White Sox 1-0 behind the four-hit pitching of Phil Ortega and an unearned run in the first inning.

The White Sox, who blew a tell-tale doubleheader at Kansas City Wednesday night, needed a sweep of the three-game series against Washington to stay afloat in the hectic, four-team scramble.

They now can win a maximum of 91 games and must finish behind either the Minnesota Twins or Boston Red Sox, who meet in a two-game set Saturday and Sunday.

The Sox bowed out meekly as Ortega recorded his second shutout of the season and squared his record at 10-10.

Southpaw Tommy John started for the Sox and quickly was clipped for the game's only run. Tim Cullen, leading off the first inning, grounded to third and first baseman Tom McCraw let

Ken Boyer's throw get away from him for an error.

Hank Allen then hit a double play ball to short, but relay man Don Buford threw the ball into the dugout after a force at second for another error. Frank Howard drew a walk and Fred Valentine drove Allen home with the first of his three singles.

John, suffering his 12th loss against 19 victories, departed for a pinch hitter in the fifth although he yielded only three hits.

Ortega struck out the first two men he faced before the Sox got

runners on first and third on singles by McCraw and Rocky Colavito. But Ortega got Ken Boyer to hit into a force play to end the inning. Ortega set the Sox down in order in the next three innings before Ken Berry doubled to center with two out in the fifth. Pinch hitter Smoky Burgess then bounced out to end the inning.

The Sox had another chance in the sixth when Buford walked and McCraw forced him at second, then went all the way to third on a stolen base and catcher Paul Casanova's throw-

ing error. But Colavito bounced out to end the threat.
