Neshaminy seeking new football coach

Add the Neshaminy job to the list of area high school football openings

John Chaump, who took the Redskins to the first-ever state playoffs in 1988, was fired last Thursday.

"I just felt it was time to make a change in direction." Neshaminy athletic director Ray Kelly said.

Neshaminy has not been above .500 in Suburban One since 1988, when it went 8-0 in the league and 11-1 overall, and won just four league games the past two seasons.

This year's Redskins finished 2-7 in the league and 4-7 overall. It was Chaump's worst season since 1980. when he went 2-8 at Neshaminy-Maple Point, where he coached from 1975-80.

The two schools were merged in 1983 with Dick Bedesem becoming head coach of the merged Neshaminy in Langhorne. When Bedesem took over at Del Val College in 1987, Chaump got Bedesem's Chaump's five-year record at Neshaminy was 36-20-0.

Chaump said he and the teachers union likely won't fight the decision because a battle could drag on for months.

By that time, there would be another coach and the team would be caught in the middle, and it will be a giant mess," said Chaump, who had to replace seven assistant coaches during the past three seasons.

Chaump said his inability to maintain a consistent staff was a factor in his dismissal.

Bill Saybolt is among the candidates to replace Chaump. He quit his coaching job at William Tennent in November because he couldn't get a chemistry teaching job there.

Other Bills who played in the Big 33 are free safety Mark Kelso and offensive linemen Mitch Frerotte and Jim Ritcher. Two Washington Redskins players, linebacker Matt Millen (Whitehall) and offensive guard Russ Grimm, also are Big 33 alumni.

Every Super Bowl has featured at least one former Big 33 player, beginning with former Green Bay Packers defensive back Herb Adderley, who played in Super Bowl I and II.
