The names of the players may have changed, but one thing remains constant. The 22-team, four-division Suburban One League consistently plays the best football in Southeastern Pennsylvania.

Do you doubt that? Consider that Central Bucks West, a member of the Colonial Division, set a state record last year by winning its 53d straight game and enters this year with a 54-game unbeaten streak, the longest current high school unbeaten streak in the nation. The Bucks, who had one tie last season, also ended the year as the No. 1 team in The Inquirer's Top 10 Poll

Consider that West and cross-town rival Central Bucks East, also of the Colonial Division, consistently draw 10,000 fans to their annual Thanksgiving Day game, rain or shine. Consider that second-ranked Ne

shaminy, a member of the Patriot Division, was one of two area teams to qualify for the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association state playoffs. (St. Pius X of the Pioneer Conference was the other.)

Consider that Souderton (eighth) Methacton (honorable tion), members of the Liberty Division, also were ranked in the Top 10.

And finally, consider that the league last year sent recruited players to such well-regarded programs as Miami (Fla.), Penn State, Maryland, Duke, Tulsa, William & Mary and Lafayette

This year should be more of the

The Central Bucks West players are saying they could be part of the best West team ever. Converted tailback George "Puddy" Gilbert (1,091 yards last year) takes over at quarterback, and fullbacks Travis Thompson and Thad Brennan and tailback Bill Tomlinson may be the best rushing trio in the area. Every offensive lineman except one weighs more than 200 pounds

Central Bucks Fast is not as deen defensively or as talented overall as Central Bucks West, but quarterback Mike Morelli has a fine arm, and the offensive backfield is deeper than usual. Lynn Pyne, a 6-foot-4, 240pounder, is being touted as the per-

fect two-way tackle.

Norristown, 5-S-1 last year, could gain some ground on C. B. West with its experienced offensive backfield.

In the Patriot Division, Council Rock and Pennsbury are the biggest threats to Neshaminy's dominance. Quarterback Adam Voyles (6-3, 220), a wide receiver last year, will run Council Rock's run-and-shoot offense, and Pennsbury is depending on an experienced offensive line to protect new quarterback Dante Mucci.

Jon Hall, a versatile rusher-receiver, James Franklin, the returning quarterback, and Mike Frederick, a 6-5, 240-pound tight end, are the

star attractions at Neshaminy Although Plymouth-Whitemarsh finished third in the Liberty Division last year and lost its entire offensive line and quarterback, the Colonials are the favorites this year Running back Dwight Shirley (1,000 yards last year), split end Kris Kofer and junior quarterback John Per-

Souderton won't be the dominating team it was last year. The Indians just don't have the size.

The Freedom Division is the weakest of the league's four divisions. Hatboro-Horsham won the title handily last year, but the Hatters have just 40 players on the team and only four have much experience.
Wissahickon is the favorite this

year. The Trojans feature tailback Andrew Hyde. The 64, 217-pounder rushed for 1,707 yards and 17 touchdowns last year.

Central Bucks West and Neshaminy always were first or second in last year's Top 10, and Ridley of the Central League remained firmly entrenched in the No. 3 spot - with good reason. The Green Raiders went 11-0. In fact, Ridley has won 10 straight Central League titles and has not lost more than one game in a season since 1977, when it went 7-3.

Coach Joe McNicholas is 152-12-2 over 16 years. This year, times could be tougher. The Raiders lost all but one starter to graduation, and that - three-year veteran linestarter backer Chris Bell - will have the added responsibility of playing guard this year.

Likewise, Springfield Delco, second in the Central League, could be hard pressed to repeat its 9-2 record; the Cougars lost their starting quarterback to injury last month

Bishop Egan, fourth in the Catholic League North Division, excelled in the playoffs last year, beating regular-season champ La Salle in the quarterfinals before losing to Archbishop Ryan by just a touchdown in

This year, Egan could be the class of the division all season. The Eagles return reserve quarterback/safety Scott Haws (four interceptions), running back Bill Buffaloe, and linebacker/running back Sean Corrigan (out for three weeks with a knee injury). Ken Carroll is a 6-7, 280-

La Salle rebounded from a 3-7 season two years ago to go 10-1 last year The Explorers lost a lot of players, but they still have size. Junior defensive lineman Keith Conlin is 6-7, 245 Archbishop Ryan, the division and league champion last year, is inexperienced this season. Only one offensive letterman is back

In the Catholic League South Division, Archbishop Carroll will have a tough time defending its division title since it has just five starters back from last year. Fullback Russell Kingsbury is a key to offensive suc-

Cardinal O'Hara has gone through two straight seasons without a regu lar-season Catholic League loss and will be shooting for a third, a feat no team has accomplished. Running back Jason Raguckas and split end Jeff Toal are the Lions' scoring threats. In 14 years, coach Bob Ewing

Penn Charter broke Malvern Prep's stranglehold on the Inter-Ac League title last year. Malvern had won or tied the title the previous four years. It tied with Penn Charter in 1986. The Friars could regain their crown, though, if returning quarterback Luke Leslie can generate some

Penn Charter has its quarterback, Ed Wojdon, back, too. It also has tailback Ken Klinger and tight end Bill Gallagher back. But the Quakers lack depth on the line

Coatesville is the defending chamion of the small but powerful Ches Mont League, but the Red Raiders are already battling injuries - they have three starters out. However, the Coatesville offense is a high-powered one, thanks to running back Dwayne Miller. Miller isn't big (5-9, 170 pounds), but he drew 50 college scouts last year after rushing for 1.580 vards

Penn Wood has won the Del-Val National Conference title four of the last five years. Although the team

has just four returning lettermen one of them is 64, 270-pound offen-sive lineman Keith Novak.

Second-place Glen Mills lost allstate defensive end James Spears to graduation, but the Bulls still have size along their interior lines. Tackle Mike Tenant is 6-2, 235.

In the American Conference, Chichester lost a talented running tandem to graduation, so the offense revolve around quarterba John Ireland and wide receiver Rob

Defending co-champion Phoenix ville is the team to beat in the Pioneer Conference. Three-year backers Brian Edens and Eric Rife are the anchors on defense. Baseball star Creighton Gubanich is the quar-

Fullback Jeremy Dalton and tailback Fred Ebert make Owen J. Roberts the team most likely to challenge Phoenixville.
