It was a night for Jon Hall but not Scott Haws.

It was a game in which Neshaminy senior quarterback James Franklin passed for 177 yards but also was sacked nine times for 35 yards in

And it was a game in which the edskins were penalized 12 times for Yet they still won, 35-0, over Bishop

"We did a lot of things wrong but we did a lot of things right," said Redskins coach John Chaump after Friday night's non-league season

Friday night's non-league opener for both teams. On the right side, Franklin com-pleted 7 of 12 passes for 177 yards and two touchdowns. He also threw one

interception. Hall caught two passes for 100 yards and two touchdowns. Tailback Rob Latronica rambled 165 yards on 10 carries. His 70-yard touchdown on 10 carries. His 70-yard touchdown on the second play of the game provided 6 of the 15 points the Redskins put on the board in their first three plays from scriimage.

"We were really moving in that first quarter," said Latronica. "We were looking real good until that second half."

That's when all the penalties began to pile up and Franklin was running for cover every time he took a snap from center.

"They kept coming at us with stunts and blitzes and our line was outmanned the whole night," said Franklin. "Our backs just couldn't

Fortunately for Neshaminy, the Ea-gles couldn't pick up on the intrica-cies of their wishbone offense.

Haws, a senior, who moved from tight end to quarterback this season, had a nightmarish evening operat-ing the wishbone. He was 0 of 5 with three interceptions and two fumbles.

When Haws turned to pitch, his backs were either a step behind or nowhere to be found, as happened in the fourth quarter when Haws' errant toss bounced twice before out-side linebacker Chris Fahy scooped it up and dashed 52 yards for a touch-The conversion accounted for the

final score of 35-0.

"Sure, it was a tough night," said Egan coach Chuck Knowles. "We made a couple of mistakes, did the wrong things. But overall, Haws did a good job. He'll do more great things than poor things before the year is out. This offense is all new to him."

"I'm not upset with the way we played," said Knowles. "We'll be fine and Haws will be fine."

There's no question the Redskins are fine - for now. But all those breakdowns on the offensive line in the last quarter

were troubling.

For instance, Neshaminy had a drive that began on its own 1-yard line, and thanks to four penalties and two sacks, ended up on the 3-yard line. "Those breakdowns were happen-ing because our people were too con-cerned over who would blitz rather

than the starting count," said Chaump. "Their blitzes definitely Latronica's running and Frank-tin's ability to find mismatches in the secondary made the blitz blun-ders a little easier to accept.

Franklin's 78-yard TD pass to Hall in the first quarter was typical of what Neshaminy did to Egan all night. Egan roverback Bill Buffaloe came up on the line and tried to pinch Hall inside. Franklin saw it.

"I knew that guy couldn't cover Jon," Franklin said. "The play allows me to decide which side I'll throw. I threw to the right."

Hali, who blew past Buffaloe, made an over-the-shoulder catch and ran unscathed into the end zone for a 15-0 lead.

Hall's second touchdown made it 28-0 late in the third quarter. Again, he made an inside-outside move on the defender for a 22-vard TD recep-

However, Hall wasn't pleased about the extra slap cornerback Len Lehman put on him in the end zone and spiked the ball in Leh-man's face. That was worth 15 yards and an unsportsmanlike-conduct enalty. "I told Jon later he is gonna have
