Egan Raps Neshaminy, 21-0, As 10,000 Pack Stadium

Bishop Egan High's defending Catholic League and City champions picked up Friday night where they left off last fall, posting a decisive, 21-0 victory over Neshaminy before a standing-room-only crowd of 10,000 at Langhorne.

Scoring in the second, third and fourth periods, the Eagles statistically crushed a Redskin team that seemed much improved over last year's 2-6-2 squad.

"I really was impressed by the way our boys played tonight," coach Dick Bedesem said. "Offensively, they did better than I'd hoped. Defensively . . . well that zero up there, speaks for itself."

EGAN GAINS 244 YARDS
Egan, which has won 13 of its last 14 games, outgained the Redskins, 244 yards to 80, and had a whopping 13-3 advantage in first downs.

It was the Eagles' second straight win after Neshaminy had won the first six games in the series. The score could have been higher except that Egan had trouble controlling the ball in the early going. Its first drive was thwarted by an interception at Neshaminy's three-yard line after Egan had marched 41 yards to the Redskin 24.

The next time Egan got the ball, it lost it on a fumble at midfield. Midway in the second quarter, another 47-yard advance was ended by a fumble at the Neshaminy 20. But three plays later, Bob Melling picked off a Neshaminy pass at the Redskin 26 to set up Egan's first score.

Six plays later, fullback Frank Yacovino bulled over from the one, then converted the first of three extra point kicks with 2:54 left in the half.

FAKE PUNT STARTS IT
Egan broke it open the first time it got the ball in the second half. A 33-yard run on a fake punt by Austin Nagle was the key play in a 62-yard drive. Larry Marshall scored the TD on a one-yard plunge on the 10th play, with 5:50 left in the third quarter.

Egan added the clincher that marred the coaching debut of Neshaminy's Pete Cordelli with 2:08 remaining in the game on a six-yard keeper around left end by junior quarterback Jim Ryan. The score was set up on a blocked punt by Jim Sheppard after Neshaminy kicker Bob Reed was forced to scramble after a bad snap from center.

Neshaminy put together its longest drive in the waning minutes of the second half, 13 yards, for its only first down of the last two periods. The Redskins finally went to the air, but with too little, too late.

Drew Gordon Sparks McDevitt Triumph

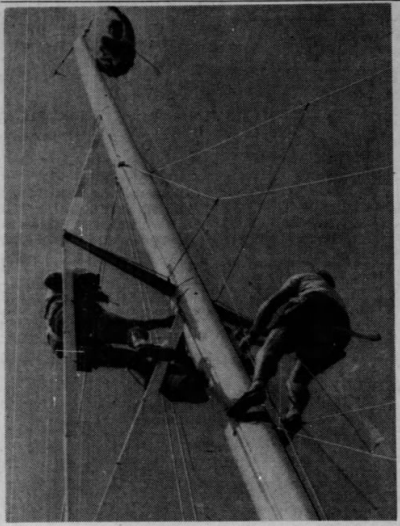

The Tommies scored on Mike Horsey's 23-yard dash.

Abington routed Woodrow Wilson of Levittown, 27-6, and William Tennent toppled Upper Moreland, 9-0, in other games.

Bob Wolfrum scored a first-period touchdown on a 22-yard run and kicked a 36-yard field goal in the second quarter for Tennent.

Sutter's birds came on the sixth, seventh, 11th, 13th, 14th and 15th. Pushkar, tournament chairman, shared birds on the 13th and 15th.

A near eagle on the home hole by Ellis enabled he and Christman to tie for the lead. Ellis' second shot landed only inches from the pin. He also birdied the second from 25 feet and the 12th from five. Christman birdied the first and sixth.

Of other former cup winners, Mrs. Harrison Flippin, Merion, was 88; Mrs. John B. Kane, Whitmarsh Valley, 85; Josephine Smith, Merion, 88, and Mrs. Ralph I. Raynor, Manufacturers, who had 15 fives, 90. Helen Castillo, Sandy Run, at 74, was second low net to Mrs. Rodstein.
