SPORTS Bensalem and Neshaminy meet in divisional clash

Bensalem is 5-2, and needs one win to clinch a winning season after winning only one game a year ago.

Neshaminy is 5-1, has dropped to No.3 in The Inquirer's weekly poll, and the Redskins' coach is very happy with the ranking.

The Owls and the 'Skins meet tomorrow night at Neshaminy (7:30 p.m.) in a Suburban One National Conference Patriot Division game.

Bensalem won its first four games, and nearly ensured a winning season last week against Central Bucks West. But a 13-yard touchdown run by the Owls' Edmund Robinson in the game's last 2 minutes was nullifed by a penalty, and the Owls lost, 10-7.

"We thought we did everything we had to to win," said Bensalem coach Jack Klebe, "but those penalties killed us. "West even got a call lin its favori before their winning field goal."

The running attack of Robinson (762 yards) and Sam Lake (549 yards) has slowed since the first few games, but both are still on track for 1,000yard seasons.

"They still want it, but their main goal is winning games," said Klebe. "For both of them, team goals come first."

Neshaminy rebounded from its 21-15 loss to Norristown with a 28-6 win over Pennridge Saturday, and should have two starters back, quarterback James Franklin, who missed last week's game with knee and ankle injuries, and wide receiver Jon Hall, who was suspended for two games. "Lou Holtz has said that when you're No. 1, three things can happen to you, and they're all bad," said Redskins head coach John Chaump. "Norristown is No. 1 now, and they're welcome to it. Let them be the big larget.

Chaump realizes that the loss to Norristown could keep his team from a return trip to the PIAA playoffs, but that's also fine with him.

"I'm disillusioned with the PIAA playoff system," he said. "We should

Morrisville's 20-0 loss to Bicentennial League rival Archbishop Kennedy ended its unbeaten season, but the Bulldogs remain atop the Independence League with a 2-0 record. Eric Sessoms' 101 yards rushing against Kennedy gives him 438 for the season. Academy of the New Church has lost four straight games. However, the Lions have been outscored by only 14-6 in their two Independence losses. North Penn (1-5, 1-3) at Central Bucks West (3-3, 2-1), tomorrow, 7:30 p.m.

The Bucks keep their games close. They've won one game by 1 point, then beat Bensalem last Saturday by 3, 10-7; they also have a pair of 3-point losses. Sophomore quarterback form losses.
