

Bucks County Football Game Friday

The fourth annual Bucks County Cancer Crusade All-Star Football Game will be contested Friday evening at Neshaminy High School, Langhorne.

The game, which features the top graduated seniors from high schools through the county, benefits the Bucks County Unit of the American Cancer Society.

The 17 high schools in the county participate with the county separated into North and South squads. The South holds a 2-1 series edge, having captured the last two games 16-14 in 1973 and 3-0 last June.

In 1972, the first year of the NCAA approved game, the North won 28-24.

Since that year the defense has pretty well dominated with it coming to a head last June.

This year an attempt to limit the defense's maneuverable and effectiveness will be tried. Linebackers may not stunt, while the goal line defense can only be used inside the 15 line. A man lined up more than 1½-yards off the ball cannot make penetration into the backfield unless flow of the ball comes toward the man. All pass coverages are allowed while

all defensive sets must be exchanged—adjustments to formation or motion need not be exchanged. No jitterbug movement is allowed with only three sets of defense are permitted outside of the goal line defense and no slanting will be allowed.

This will put pressure on the game officials: Len Lithgow, field judge; Walt Smerconish, umpire; Ray Daikeler, head linesman; Joe Byers, back judge; and Frank Robidoax, referee.

The game is listed for kickoff at 7:30 p.m. with pre-game activity beginning at 7 p.m. Ticket prices are \$3 for reserved and \$2 for general admission.

The North is coached by Mike Pet-tine, the highly successful mentor at Central Bucks West High School in Doylestown. He is assisted by Council Rock's Walt Snyder, Quakertown's Frank Prusch and Jim Harrington from his own staff.

Schools that make up the North squad are Pennridge, Quakertown, Central Bucks West and Central Bucks East from the Bux-Mont League, Archbishop Wood, Council Rock, Palisades, William Tennent and New Hope-

Solebury.

Representing Pennridge are half-back Bob Riddick and linebacker Jerry Hinkle.

From Quakertown, there is guard Steve Rush, halfback-quarterback Doug Young and defensive tackle Gary Mammele.

Central Bucks West dominates the team with nine on the North squad. They include: tight end Mike Mill, receiver Tom Jensen, tackles Tony Spinosa and Barry Fritz, center Bill Carver, quarterback Bill Borresen, running back Gary Schillo, running back-linebacker Ollie Wilson and linebacker Dan Chermela.

There are three players on the squad from Central Bucks East: tackle Brad Morrill, running back Tim Wilson and Steve Mangle.

In addition there are nine players from Archbishop Wood, five from Council Rock, two from William Tennent, and one from Palisades.

Bob Hart of Bensalem is coaching the South which is represented by the following schools: Bensalem, Bishop Egan, Bristol, Delhaas, Morrisville, Neshaminy, Pennsbury and Woodrow

Wilson.

The North and South have six candidates for queen which will be determined by the number of tickets sold in each school as compared to the number of students enrolled in the school. The schools with the highest percentage of tickets sold will have their nominee crowned queen during the halftime festivities. The percentage will be based on total number of tickets sold, not just those sold within the school.

Cathy Cramp from Quakertown is a candidate for queen in the North with a Queen selected from the North and South.

Some of the other rules in the game: a team trailing by more than nine or more points has the option to receive or kick following a score. No shotgun formations or wide spreads are allowed and all offensive sets must be exchanged. Motion is permitted if agreed upon by both teams and the offense is allowed to shift offensive sets.

Each player must play at least 20 plays during the game.
