Football Game? While nobody really knows except the players themselves, it was evident Friday evening at Neshaminy High School, Langhorne, before 7,000 fans. that that fact wasn't going to affect the

North team in 1975. North went out and destroyed the Bob Hart (of Delhaas) coached team 36-12 in the most impressive offensive display in three years.

It was also the only game of the event this just the fourth year - that was dominated by one team. The victory by the North also evened the series at twogames apiece and it was the second time Mike Pettine of Central Bucks West has coached the team and been

There was much joy on the North side of the field while disappointment was obvious on the faces of the South squad as the Most Valuable Player awards

were presented. This was the year to bring the offerse back into the game and that both teams did, especially the North through Pettine's coaching and Bill Borreson's quarterbacking.

But it was evident from the start that the North squad wasn't going to play in awe of the much bigger South All-Americans and All-States.

The South, which draws from the immediate Philadelphia area, is dotted with huge schools of the likes of Penns-

Neshaminy, Bensalem and Bishop Egan. "I think what got the kids up," said

Pettine, "the South said some things that they were going to shut us out. We have good players in the Northern Section, it's just that we are understed. In addition to that the North had an excellent nucleus of championship caliber ball players who were familiar

with winning. Eighteen of the 33 man North roster came from Central Bucks West and Archbishop Wood (nine apiece) of Warminster. The Bucks won the Bux-Mont League championship, going undefeated, while Wood was one of the top teams in the Philadelphia Catholic

About the only glory Riddick got from the game was the satisfaction of playing despite the injury

'I was just glad I was able to play," he said while watching the MVP
