LANGHORNE — Neshaminy put together a bruising running game which accounted for touchdown marches of 88, 98 and 65 yards Friday night as the Redskins handed Allen its third straight setback 20-7.

Neshaminy, in evening its overall record at 2-2 and its Big Seven mark at 1-1, gained 374 yards on the ground, with junior halfbacks Steve Sroba and Mark Spadacino leading the way. Spadacino scored the first, and Sroba got the other TD for the Redskins.

Allen got its only score of the game in the third period on Ken Shafer's two-yard plunge, and two other Canary threats were stopped first by a fumble at the Neshaminy 22 and later by an interception at the Redskins 15. The defeat was the second in Big Seven play for Coach Fritz Hallacore's club.

Neshaminy got its first score with seven minutes left in the first quarter, driving 98 yards in 13 plays after an Allen punt. Sroba had the long run of the drive, an 18-yarder, and then, with the ball on the Allen 11, Sroba burst through to the 1 and fumbled. The ball rolled into the end zone, where Spadacino pounced on it for a touchdown.

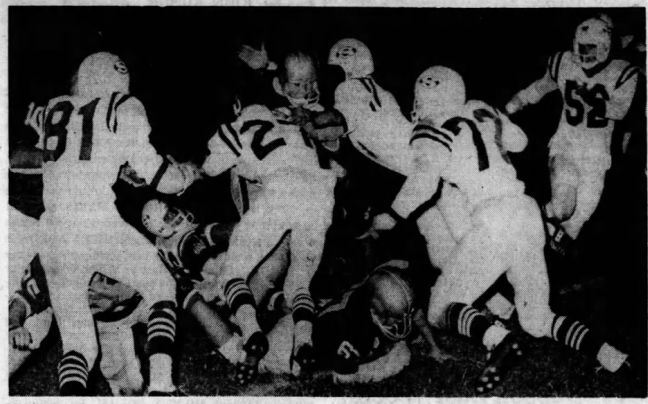
Allen got moving in the second period behind quarterback Kim McQuilken and running of Shafer. Deep in Neshaminy territory, McQuilken hit tight end John Bartiges for a 13-yard gain, but Bartiges fumbled, and Neshaminy recovered at its own 4.

On the next play, Doug Mason lost two yards, but the Redskins then marched 98 for a 13-half-time lead. Sroba had a 44-yard run and gained 60 yards along the way, and Spadacino, a 175-pounder, cracked over from the 3.

Allen's only score was set up by a Neshaminy punt which went only 14 yards, with Shafer fielding it on the Redskins' 45 and returning it to the 20. The Canaries won in five plays.

Neshaminy rounded out its scoring in the fourth period when it drove 65 yards for a TD with 5:35 left in the game. Sroba, who was the workhorse most of the night, climaxed the drive, breaking two tackles en route to a 16-yard TD run.

It took Slatington until the final period to put together a drive in which nothing went wrong last night and that one flawless march gave the Bulldogs the points they needed to turn back Leighton 7-0 in the Lehigh Valley League opener for the club.

Halted six times inside the Leighton 35—and twice inside the Indian 10—Slatington finally cashed in behind the quarterbacking of Gary Van Norman and a defensive sem before nearly 7,000 persons at Slatington, 4,000 of whom greeted the field four deep on the sidelines.

The victory started Slatington (2-1) off on the right foot in its quest of the Lehigh Valley League championship. And the team Coach Jack Cassebaum's unit conquered is the one picked by most observers as having the best shot at the title next to Slatington.

Slatington's defense—powered by husky junior tackle Ivan Weiss and quick Derek (Duke) Lilly— which kept Leighton (2-2) from making the crucial plays all night, turned in the play that produced the victory.

Following a Slatington punt, Leighton took over on its own 13. Three running plays—all powerful halfback Darryl Klotz who finished as Leighton's top ground-gainer with 47 yards on 17 carries—gained only two yards and the Indians' Barry dropped back to punt.

Slatington's forward wall stormed in on Barry and bobbled the snap from center, dropped the ball, scooped it up

and headed toward the left sideline. He was smothered at the 11 and Slatington took over.

Lilly went three yards on the first play, Van Norman gained three more, Lilly added another three and Van Norman cracked over center for a first down on the fourth-down play that put the ball on the 1. Van Norman's sneak put the ball, when mes-

ured, a half a length past the first down pole. On the fifth play of the drive, Van Norman dove across at the 10-07 mark and Kim Edwards converted for the 7-0 lead.

Slatington, however, was not home free as yet. Leighton—aided by a 35-yard strike from Norm Frey to Wilbur Ahner—reached the Slatington 25 before Lilly picked off a Frey aerial

and returned it to the Bulldog 31.

A short time later, Slatington, in its desire to control the ball, missed on a fourth-down play at the Leighton 45 and turned over the ball. Frey hit halfback Bill Sherman with a 15-yard pass on the sixth play of the drive to put the ball on the Slatington 25 with 1:05 left. The Slatington defense, however, stiffened and Weiss dumped Frey for a 10-yard loss on a short tackle. Leighton pulled out all the stops in an effort to score as it brought in its No. 1 quarterback, Terry Woggenrich, who had not played before last night because of an injury suffered in preseason.

He swept left end for nine yards but on the next play, his pass was intercepted on the 18 by little Ron Kuntz who returned it 82 yards for an apparent score. But a clipping penalty brought the play back. Slatington, nevertheless, retained possession and ran out the clock.

Slatington had drives halted by Leighton fourth-down stands on the 19 and 30 in the first period, the 8 in the second period, and the 39 in the third period. Bruce Rehrig recovered a Lewis Kern fumble on the Leighton 6 in the third period to halt another march and also pounced on a Lilly fumble at the 25 in the second period.

Townsend's 213 1st In Alcan Tourney

SOUTHPORT, England (AP)—Peter Townsend, a 22-year-old Briton who polished his golf game in the United States this past summer, whipped around the drying 7,140 yards of the Royal Birkdale course Friday in 69 to the lead in the \$200,000 Alcan tournament.

Gay Brewer of Dallas, who won the inaugural Alcan a year ago in a playoff with Billy Casper of San Diego, also posted a 69 and heads into Saturday's final 18 holes one stroke behind Townsend.

Bob Murphy of Nichols, Fla., who has won almost \$100,000 his first year as a pro, zoomed to a par 74 in the third round because of poor putting and slid into third place from a tie for first.

The coleader with Murphy at 36 holes, Bobby Cole of South Africa, skied to a 79 and now is deadlocked with three others for sixth at 220. Townsend has an aggregate of 213. Brewer has 216 and Murphy 215.
