LANGHORNE — Neshaminy effectively controlled the ball for three quarters Friday night and a field goal and a touchdown were enough for the Redskins to down Freedom 10-0.

Behind the running of Steve Sroba and Andy Koch, the Redskins outgained the Patriots in rushing 181-43 as they marched 80 yards for a third-quarter touchdown and 37 yards for a second-period field goal.

The Patriots, meanwhile, could find little success through the air as Glenn Hauze hit on only four of 13 passes.

Freedom's best drive of the night came at the end of the first half when Dick Hammersmith recovered a Neshaminy fumble on the Freedom 43.

Hauze threw to John Pecsek for 13 yards to the Redskin 29, and after being set back to the 33 tossed to Fred Mendoza to the 3.

With time running out, Rehn Peterson carried to the 2. There was mixup on the field and the officials declared that time had run out for the Patriots who had two timeouts remaining.

Earlier in the period, Neshaminy had gone ahead on a 21-yard field goal by Chris Bahr.

Taking the ball on the Freedom 42, Redskins' quarterback John Swartz threw 23 yards to Sroba at the 20, and five plays later Neshaminy faced a fourth-and-one situation at the 5. The Redskins elected to let the soccer-style kicker go for the field goal attempt.

STOLL WINS IN DEBUT

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) — Wake Forest clocked in its opening football game under new coach Cal Stoll, former assistant at Michigan State. The Deacons beat North Carolina State 22-21 on a two-point conversion play with five seconds left to play.

Neshaminy used up most of the third quarter on their 80-yard march capped by Ed Romanowski's 6-yard slant with 1:20 to go. The Redskins stuck to the ground for 20 plays of the drive and Swartz passed to Koch for 10 yards.

In the final quarter, the Redskins put enough pressure on Hauze to dump him twice and pick off two interceptions. Freedom was unable to get inside the Redskin 29.

Neshaminy had opened the game with a 40-yard march in 12 plays, but the Patriots held at their own 11.

76ers Bow 134-128 In Two Overtimes

DETROIT (AP) — The hot-shooting of Jimmy Walker, Eddie Miles and Dave Bing enabled the Detroit Pistons to beat the Philadelphia 76ers 134-128 in double overtime Friday night in a National Basketball Association game.

In two other NBA games, Ron Williams' disputed field goal on a 20-foot jump shot lifted the San Francisco Warriors to a 111-110 victory over the Boston Celtics and the Baltimore Bullets held on to defeat the Seattle SuperSonics 126-112.

After the score had been tied 20 times, the last at 121-121 in the second extra period, a basket by Terry Dischinger, a free throw by Howard Komives and two free throws by Dischinger put the Pistons ahead by five points. Detroit retained command the rest of the way.

It was only the second victory in the last six games for the Pistons, while Philadelphia went down to its fourth defeat in five games and first road setback of the season after three victories.

The two teams took turns with hot spurts during the earlier going. At one stage, Detroit whipped together 16 straight

points to lead by as many as 11 points, but the 76ers fought back to hold a 76-75 advantage.

At one stage in the fourth quarter, Philadelphia led by eight points. But then there were eight ties to wrap up the regulation time with two free throws by Walt Bellamy bringing the teams even at 104-104.

It took two free throws by Miles to force the second overtime after Hal Greer had pumped in 9 of the 13 Philadelphia points to make it 117-117 at the end of the first overtime.

Walker finished with 29 points, Miles 27 and Bing 24. Greer, Billy Cunningham, who fouled out in the fourth quarter, and Archie Clark all had 26 for the losers.

Most observers in the Boston crowd of 8,627 thought Williams fired his decisive shot after the 24-second clock had sounded. However, rookie referee John Parker ruled that Williams had beat the clock.

That put the Warriors ahead 109-107 with just 45 seconds to play. San Francisco's Jerry Lucas and Boston's John Havlicek then swapped baskets before time ran out.
