

Liberty Journeys to Neshaminy; Lehigh in Annual Trip to Penn

The number of undefeated football teams in The Morning Call area has diminished appreciably in the last few weeks, and there is the possibility of further depreciation this afternoon.

Liberty, which had to struggle to prevent Allen from gaining an upset victory last weekend (the game ended in a 14-14 tie), has a most difficult task at Neshaminy. The Redskins were beaten by Dieruff 12-7 last Friday night in a Big Seven Conference upset.

Upper Perkiomen (5-0) and Pen Argyl (4-0) should get by without too much trouble, but this has been a season of weird happenings and they cannot afford to play relaxed. The Indians are at home with winless Hatboro-Horsham in a Bux-Mont League game. Pen Argyl entertains Pocono Mountain in the Lehigh-Northampton League.

There is plenty of interesting activity aside from the unbeaten, both scholastically and collegiately. Central Catholic, which walloped Freedom last week as Tommy Williams ran for 213 yards and four touchdowns, entertains Bethlehem Catholic in ASD Stadium (7:30); Easton, which broke a three-game losing streak by defeating Becahi 16-12 on two TD passes from Don Gentzle to Tom Atti-

nello, entertains Freedom, and Salisbury shoots for its fifth straight win when it travels to Hellertown to face a team it never has beaten.

Muhlenberg, which played superbly on defense last week only to bow to Lebanon Valley 13-12, travels to Ursinus; Lehigh, a shocking winner over Rutgers, makes its annual trip to Franklin Field to oppose Penn; Lafayette entertains big, strong Boston University as it seeks its fourth straight win, and Moravian entertains PMC Colleges, hopeful of snapping a two-game losing (and shutout) string.

Liberty, which had rushed for 852 yards in victories over Hazleton, Becahi and Pennsbury before being checked by Allen, will rely again on Tom Donchez

and Mike Lukevics. Donchez, a 196-pound senior, was stopped brilliantly by the Canaries, but has the potential to bounce back against Neshaminy.

Quarterback John Fistner doesn't throw often, but his success has been good. He has completed 11 of 20 passes, with four going for touchdowns.

Neshaminy, which had blanked Allen 21-0 before losing to Dieruff, relies greatly upon the running of Steve Sroba.

Upper Perk and Pen Argyl each have been most impressive on offense, the Indians with 969 yards rushing and 478 passing, and the Green Knights with 917 on the ground and 211 through the air. Woody Petchel had scored 14 touchdowns for the Knights, while Jim Zepp and

Jim Stoudt had tallied nine and five TDs for the Indians.

The Upper Perk game is being billed as Decade Appreciation Day for Coach Bill Keeny and his staff, and appropriate ceremonies will be held after the game.
