

Neshaminy-Allen game highlights big Friday night

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Take two key Section Two battles, toss in a Big Seven encounter and mix with a season's debut and you have all the ingredients for a big Friday night of football in Lower Bucks County.

The evening begins when George School opens its season with a road battle at Germantown Academy, 3:15 p.m. Then the scene switches to under the lights as Neshaminy hosts Allentown Allen at 7:30, and Lower Moreland visits Morrisville at 8. Jenkintown travels to Bristol and Chester invades Delhaas at the Bristol Township Athletic Field, both games starting at 8.

On Saturday, William Tennent hosts Methacton and Bethlehem Liberty arrives at Pennsbury, 1:30 p.m. At 2, Council Rock visits Woodrow Wilson, Pius X of Rose-to challenges Bensalem, and Archbishop Wood faces Thomas Jefferson High of Elizabeth, N.J. on the road.

Neshaminy coach Jack Swartz is in the same position Pennsbury and Chuck Kane was last week. He faces an improving Allen club, one that Swartz respects.

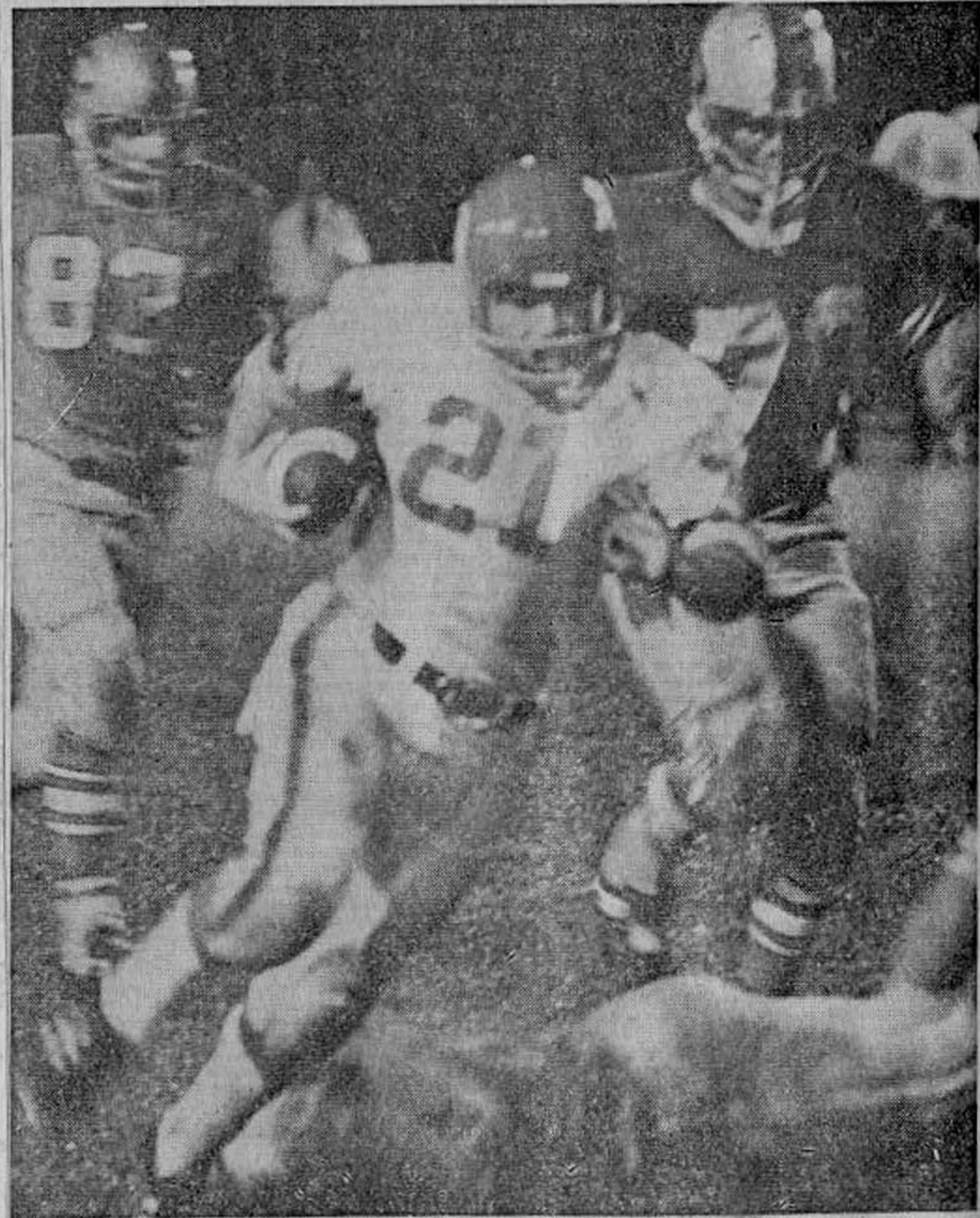
Big Squad

Both coaches had praise for the other team. Conger has scouted the Lions and says, "They're a good football team, but more than that, they have a lot of kids going only one way. Such a large squad gives a lot of their players a chance to rest, something you can't do with one-platoon ball.

"Lower Moreland also runs the option and Wishbone very well," Conger continued. "Sutherland (Bill) has shown he can handle the run as well as throw."

Not to be outdone, Tryens praised Morrisville. "They are a well-drilled ballclub," he stated. "I'd say they're a fundamentally sound team with strength in the backfield. Detweiler (Bob) has impressed me and Johnson (Jeff) is one of the best linemen around."

"Only our pride was injured in the loss to Interboro last week," said Tryens. Asked if he thought this was a must game for Lower Moreland, he replied, "Morrisville is the Section Two champ, right? We gotta beat the champs."
