# Pennsbury adds 5,300 seats for 'The Game'

Falcon Field, the home of the unbeaten Fairless Hills Pennsbury High School football team, will "change" drastically for the Nov. 18 meeting with Langhorne Neshaminy.

Pennsbury has ordered 5,300 new seats for the collision in Section One of the Lower Bucks County Football League and the Big Seven Conference.

"We'll seat 11,700 for the game," Pennsbury athletic director George Jarmoska said. "In order to meet ticket demands an extra 5,300 seats will be erected on both sides of the field and in both end zones."

Jarmoska and Neshaminy athletic director George O'Brien made a joint announcement on the ticket arrangements. They both said even though Neshaminy and Pennsbury have scheduled contests this weekend it was necessary to prepare for the Nov. 18 meeting now so everyone will fully understand the pre-planned arrangements well in advance.

Jarmoska explained several other conditions which will surround the contest.

"There will be no standing room for this game due to the area used for the extra seating loca-

tions. All seat sections will be color coded to match ticket colors. Tickets will be sold in a certain color to match the seating capacity of that respective section."

General admission ticket sales at both schools will be held at their respective stadiums. Ticket sales at Pennsbury will begin at 12 noon Monday, Nov. 13.

Ticket sales at Neshaminy will

begin Monday, Nov. 13, at 3 p.m.

Both athletic directors made it clear, "No ticket sales or ticket orders will be taken by phone or mail at their respective offices."

Pennsbury's ticket booth will be located near Queen Anne Drive near the high school. Ticket purchasers are requested not to use the driveways near the Pennsbury High School due to the student

activities adjacent to the senior high school.

Neshaminy's ticket booth is located just outside the school's stadium in Langhorne.

A maximum of four general admission tickets (\$1.25) will be sold to any one purchaser.

### Check The Colors

Jarmoska said when entering the stadium, spectators should

look for identifying colors on the bleachers and stands and to match the color of the ticket they have purchased.

On the day of the game the gates will open at 10 a.m.

# Neshaminy has special sale

Langhorne Neshaminy High School football fans who are considered in the reserved seat category will be handled separately for next week's football game against Fairless Hills Pennsbury.

Neshaminy athletic director George O'Brien said special sales will begin at 3 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 14, at Langhorne. Tickets will be sold from the ticket booth at the stadium.

"Those persons holding reserved seat booklets for the 1972 home Neshaminy football games may purchase one reserved seat ticket for the Neshaminy-Pennsbury game for each reserved booklet held."

O'Brien added, "1972 reserved seat booklets or some other form of identification will be requested. This sale is limited to reserved booklet holder."

Pennsbury athletic director George Jarmoska said, "There are no reserved seat tickets available at Pennsbury due to the fact these were completely sold out on a season basis at the beginning of the year."

Neshaminy fans planning to attend the game who do not have 1972 reserved seat booklets should purchase general admission tickets during the Monday

sale at the stadium ticket booth at 3 p.m.

The public sale of tickets to the game will be restricted to the stadium, O'Brien said.
