Nittany Lions Paced By Kerr

UNIVERSITY PARK — Halfback Jim Kerr was the statistical pacesetter on a Penn State football team which compiled a 6-3 record during the regular season.

The 182-pound senior led in rushing with 389 yards and a 4.2 average, in pass receiving with 13 catches good for 163 yards and two touchdowns, in scoring with 52 points, and in kickoff returns with eight for 158 yards.

Quarterback Dick Hoak led total offense with 396 passing yards and 284 rushing yards. He completed 25 or 46 passes for five touchdowns and averaged 4.3 yards rushing. Fullback Sam Sobczak edged Hoak for the No. 2 rushing spot with 287 yards and a 4.1 average.

Captain Henry Oppermann gave Kerr a battle for pass receiving laurels. The lanky end caught 13 for 131 yards and a TD.

Quarterbacks Galen Hall compiled the most yards passing with 448 on 39 completions in 89 attempts. He also threw for five scores.

Oppermann, sophomore halfback Al Gursky, and sophomore fullback Buddy Torris, deadlocked for second place in the scoring derby.
