

Law Is Honorable Mention On '65 UPI All-State 11

A backfield which accounted for 80 touchdowns and a line which sports a 212-pound weight average make the 1965 United Press International All-State Football Team announced today one of the most powerful in recent years.

The team features a scrambling, running quarterback—Neshaminy's Jim Colbert—who gained more than 900 yards on the ground, ran for 15 touchdowns and passed for seven scores.

It has a pair of speed-merchant halfbacks — Wesley Garnett, of unbeaten Pittsburgh Westinghouse, and Jack Dolbin, of Pottsville — who together piled up 50 touchdowns. And in Charleroi's Dick Kujawski it

has a fullback whom Coach Rab Currie rated second only to the school's all-time great, Myron Pottios, who was all-state, all-American and all-pro.

Gets High Rating

The 212-pound line has 245-pound, six-foot, four-inch "Man Mountain" Mike McCoy, of Erie Cathedral Prep, rated by many sports observers as the best schoolboy interior lineman in the city's history.

Five of the 11 boys on the all-senior first team made the UPI all-state honorable mention list as juniors. They are McCoy, Garnett, Kujawski, Rich Saul, of Butler, and Tom Templeton, of Tyrone. Templeton, a two-way player, anchored the Golden Eagle line which held seven straight opponents scoreless.

The WPIAL, the forge on which so many fine players are first hammered out, produced its usual share of all-staters. Exactly half of the 34 men on the first three teams are from WPIAL schools and five are on the first team. A tie in the balloting for one of the third team backfield spots between Art Ray of Harrisburg John Harris and Joe Dziedzic of Blakely accounts for the naming of 12 men to that team.

Comments on Players

Here are some of the remarks of coaches and sports writers which accompanied their ballots:

On Rich Saul — "The college which gets him will have a three-year varsity starter."

On Brownsville's 230-pound end Don (Bull) Law—"He did everything but run the scoreboard."

On Steelton center Mike Stubljar — "His ability to 'fire out' with such amazing speed and snap the ball simultaneously is without equal."

On Dolbin—"He broke a scoring record which has stood for 18 years."

On Garnett, who scored 166 points during the regular season—"He already has letters of inquiry from 83 colleges and universities."

On Colbert—"He is the best scrambling quarterback we've ever seen in the high school ranks."

McGuire Is Knick Coach

NEW YORK (UPI)—Dick McGuire, the quiet man of basketball, assumes the most taxing job in his profession tonight when he makes his debut as coach of the New York Knickerbockers.

The 40-year-old McGuire, nicknamed "Mumbles" during his collegiate days at St. John's University, was named to succeed former teammate Harry Gallatin Monday night in a surprise move by the Knick management. New York is host to St. Louis at Madison Square Garden tonight.

"I'm sorry it had to be Harry," said McGuire. "I've known him a few years and it's funny taking over his job."

McGuire, a New York boy and a former player on the Knicks, inherits the most frustrating job in the National Basketball Association. The Knickerbockers have finished last in the Eastern Division the last six years and they're back in their customary position this season with a 6-15 record.

McGuire, a brilliant playmaker during his career, indicated that he was ready to make some changes.

"I believe the Knicks are a better running club than they have shown," he said. "If you don't run in today's game you're in trouble."

McGuire also said something would have to be worked out between guards Dick Barnett and Howie Komives, since he believed that only one backcourtman should concentrate on shooting.

Gallatin was apprised of his dismissal after returning home from a practice session Monday night. He had been named to the job just 11 months ago.

"I played with Dick a number of years, nine as a matter of fact, and I want to wish him every success in the world," Gallatin said. "He's one of my favorite guys. I hope he can take this challenge that exists here in New York and do a good job of it."

Kickers Tied In AFL Scoring Race

NEW YORK (UPI) — The plight of the last-place Boston Patriots must be particularly distressing to Gino Cappelletti, who has scored 88 points this season to be tied with Buffalo's Pete Gogolak for scoring leadership in the American Football League.

Cappelletti, a 31-year-old veteran, has accounted for over half of the points scored this season by the Patriots, who have managed only 174 while compiling a 2-8-2 record.

Gogolak, who finished second to Cappelletti in the scoring race last season, has gained all his points with his soccer-style
