that tough defense." Swartz agrees with his op-

ponents' analysis. "Most of the credit for our six wins this year has to go to our defense. Mike Emanuel the defensive signal caller. has really rallied the team around him." Swartz said.

The Wilson offense, under the direction of senior quarterback Kenny Heath should

prove a challenge to the Neshaminy defense.

"Wilson has a balanced attack and a strong passing game which we will have to look out for." said Swartz. "Kenny Heath is a true leader who can mix up a run-

ning and passing game at the line of scrimmage." Sorrentino said "He has at least 16 touchdown passes so far this sea-

son. We have one receiver who has caught 11 of them." Swartz said he thinks the Wilson defense has been un-

derrated. Sorrentino voiced his respect for Neshaminy's specialty teams and field goal

kicking. Add to all this strength and expertise a crowd which will probably exceed 16,000 and two teams both of which see the game as a chance to be number one. Both coaches agree: "It should be quite a game."

In other Lower Bucks County play. Pennsbury will travel to Easton to play this Big Seven Conference foe Friday

night. Pennsbury has shown itself to be quite a bit more powerful than many had supposed when they upset Allentown Dieruff a few weeks ago. The team defeated an uneven William Tennent squad Saturday, by a score of 14-0.
