

Mountie Defensive Captain Selected 1st-Team Guard; BEA's Condo Also Honored

PHILIPSBURG — Greg Stine, defensive captain of the Philipsburg-Osceola High School football team for the past two seasons, became the fifth player from the Clearfield-Philipsburg area to be named to the Associated Press All-State Team today.

Stine, a 5-8, 175-pound senior guard, and Bald Eagle Area halfback Mike Condo are the only players from nearby areas on the first four teams. Punxsutawney quarterback Mickey Depp was given honorable mention.

Stine is the first lineman from the area to receive such recognition. The only other area players to make the team were backs Bill Miller of Clearfield in 1939, Stu Wiggins of Clearfield in 1952, Vic Jones of Clearfield in 1955 and Larry Wise of Philipsburg-Osceola in 1959.

Cocher Bill Haushalter, who has called Stine the best player pound for pound, he's ever had, said this about the Mountie defensive captain:

"Greg is a very fine player and deserves the honor. He has brought a great deal of honor and prestige to his team and community and we are all proud of him.

"He did a tremendous job all season, especially against Hollidaysburg. They were inside our 15 three times, and three times he called the right defensive plays. This picked up our whole team.

"He has an uncanny knack of calling the right plays. He can smell what's coming."

What is Stine's reaction to the honor?

"I really don't know what to say, except that I feel greatly honored and a little surprised," he said.

What are his plans for the future?

"Right now I don't know, I would like to go to college, but I don't know where. The only thing I can do now is wait for the results of college board examinations."

Although Stine's first statewide recognition came this year, making all-star teams is nothing new to him. He has been on All-District and Central Counties All-Star teams since he was a sophomore.

He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Stine of Philipsburg.
