

Easton and Pennsbury Head Big 6 Selections

Cochampions Pennsbury and Easton accounted for 14 of 24 first-team selections on the 1966 Big Six Conference all-star team, which was picked yesterday during a conference meeting at Pennsbury.

Coach Erle Baugher's Falcons, who were beaten only by Allen in the conference, placed four men each on the offensive and defensive platoon; while Coach Bobby Rute's Red Rovers, whose only conference defeat came to Pennsbury, placed three men on each unit.

Allen, which finished with a 2-2-1 record in the conference, followed with four selections — two on each unit — with Dieruff (2-3) and Liberty (1-4) gaining three spots each. Neshaminy, which went 1-3-1 in conference play, failed to place a man on either first unit.

One of Allen's selections was Mike Mess, the hard-hitting linebacker who was selected to

the first team all-state by United Press International and second team by Associated Press. Another was Neil Pendry, an honorable mention choice by both wire services.

John Cappellano of Easton, who was a third-team UPI selection and received honorable mention AP, was chosen in the offensive backfield, as was Bill Noah of Pennsbury, who won AP and UPI honorable mention.

Other all-staters picked included: John Strohl of Liberty, who was third-team AP; Frank Weierbach of Dieruff, honorable mention AP; Dave Hoyer of Pennsbury, third-team UPI; Greg Taylor of Pennsbury, honorable mention UPI, and George Trissler of Dieruff, honorable mention UPI.

Donald Henry, Pennsbury principal, was elected president of the conference. Charles Klein, Liberty principal, be-

comes vice president, while Phil Phillippi, Liberty athletic director, was re-elected secretary.
