

# Junior backs run Langhorne by Wilson, 34-15

Neshaminy Langhorne's explosive pair of junior tailbacks teamed up to power the Redskins to a booming 34-15 victory over the Woodrow Wilson Rams yesterday at Henry C. Morgan Stadium.

Steve Fario, who rushed for 107 yards and scored two touchdowns, accounted for the game's longest gain when he went 42 yards down the left sideline for Langhorne's final score.

Randy Valone, who picked up 92 yards on 24 carries, scored the first Redskin touchdown when he skipped

five yards to complete a 12-play drive that traveled 76 yards.

"We had real good running today," said Langhorne coach Charlie Schmidt, whose Redskins are now 3-1 in Lower Bucks County League play. "We got a good game from our tailbacks. Fario did exceptionally well and Valone did a good job."

#### Big play

Fario played a key role in keeping the first Redskin drive alive when he carried on fourth down from the Wilson 15.

Fario, who had to reach the Wilson 11 for the first down, shot straight into

the Ram line and made it to the 10.

"We were making the big plays," said Schmidt. "We made the plays on third and long and on second and long. That's what makes the offense go."

Fario also kept the second Redskin drive alive when he picked up 11 yards on a third and four situation. Langhorne's second march, ended when Chris Beswick caught a 21-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Bruce Cordelli.

#### Third drive

Langhorne mounted another long drive and scored again the third time it had the ball. This time it was 67

yards on 12 plays. Fario completed it with a three yard burst that sent Langhorne to the locker room with a 20-0 halftime lead.

"They moved the ball and they controlled the ball," said Woodrow Wilson coach Ed Neumann. "They controlled the ball for long periods of time."

Langhorne, which scored every time it had the ball in the first half, punted for the first time with 6:55 left in the third period.

The Redskin punt came after Greg Edwards returned the second half kickoff 41 yards to start Wilson off to its first touchdown.

#### Wilson score

Wilson narrowed Langhorne's lead to 20-7 when quarterback Jim Jones went 34 yards on an option play. Jones' play could have brought the Rams within a touchdown had they not failed to score from the one-inch line on the last play of the first half.

"When you look at the final score you might say that play didn't mean much," said Neumann. "But I think it did emotionally. If you score there and come and score first in the second half you're only down by six."

As it turned out, the Rams did come out to get a quick score on their first possession of the third period. Then, after forcing the Redskins to punt, it looked like they had gained the momentum.

But the momentum quickly turned back to Langhorne when senior tackle Jim Riley recovered a Ram fumble. Nine plays and 32 yards later the Redskins had their fourth touchdown and a big 27-7 lead with 1:15 left in the third period.

"They're the best team we've played," said Neumann, whose Rams have met Council Rock and Pennsbury but not Bensalem.

The Redskins capped their attack with Fario's 42-yard run in the final quarter before Wilson used a fumble recovery by George Nahodil to set up an 18-yard scoring drive.
