## Redskins Seek Second Win of Season Against Lower Moreland Eleven Here

Neshaminy High will seek its second football win of the season Friday night at 8:15 o'clock on the local field when they oppose Lower Moreland High School of Huntingdon Valley in a nocturnal contest.

Heartened considerably by last week's 20-0 rout of Jenkintown, Coach Jim Egli's charges are heavily favored to defeat Lower Moreland. However, overconfidence even when the Redskins won the Lower Bucks championship a few years ago almost lost games to the Morelanders.

For that reason Coach Egli says his boys will not let up this week until the situation is well in hand. In fact, perhaps Lower Moreland will be better than expected. Last year Neshaminy went into the game against Lower Moreland highly favored and walked off the field at halftime with nary a score. Fortunately a last half rally pulled through to a win.

When Mike DeRisi was at the Langhorne School coaching two Lower Bucks title-winning teams, he always had trouble bringing the Redskins up for Lower Moreland.

### Looked Good Last Week

Neshaminy was impressive last week in beating Jenkintown, 20-0. Bob Castle scored two of the touchdowns and Ray Mongillo made the other. But the entire team had a hand in the locals first triumph.

Castle scored in the first period when Neshaminy staged a march immediately after the kickoff. They marched to the eight on a sustained drive from where Castle

went across on a reverse. Lex missed his placement attempt for the conversion.

In the second quarter Mongillo took a 13-yard pass from Lou Maurer. Ferman Lex booted the extra point. In the third period, Mongillo tossed a 25-yard pass to Castle and Lex added the point.

### Missed Other Chances

The Redskins missed two other scoring chances when players were unable to hold passes. Two men missed a perfect strike thrown by Mongillo, and Mongillo later missed one tossed by Maurer.

Jenkintown, playing its first game, showed a lack of coordination. The Drakes threatened only once in the third quarter when they lost the ball after driving inside of the Neshaminy 20. That was as close as they came to a touchdown.

Defensively Don Leitch, Mongillo, Ray Brodie and Ed Carber made the most tackles for Neshaminy. The locals completed seven out of 16 passes and registered 10 first downs to six for Jenkintown.

Coach Egli plans to use the same starting lineup Friday night against Lower Moreland which defeated Jenkintown. Lou Maurer will call signals with Don Barnett and Bob Castle handling the half-back posts. Husky Ray Mongillo will start at fullback. On the line, Ken Dorsey and Al Hofmann will start at ends. Ed Carber and Charley Yantis get the nod at tackle, with Don Leitch and Wes Galloway starting at guard. Ernie Peitch will be the center.
