

Langhorne High Loses Thriller

At Riverside Under Lights, 7-6

A fiery, high-spirited Langhorne High eleven lost a close 7 to 6 contest to a heavier Riverside squad Saturday night before 3,000 fans on the winner's field. In nearly achieving an upset, the Redskins played a stirring brand of ball, with the line bracing while deep in their own territory on several stands and Schneider and his backfield mates presenting a constant passing threat.

Riverside started moving in the first quarter, but was repulsed on the Langhorne 22 yard line after driving from their 30. The Langhorne line, playing improved ball, held Keihner for four downs without a gain at that spot and after two plays moved the locals to the 23. Schneider quick kicked out of danger to the Riverside 40. Dick Lukens went downfield fast to dump Kolongowski.

Riverside then opened a 60 yard drive that resulted in a touchdown. Ken Keihner bulled his way over from the 12 to shoot Riverside into the lead. He added the extra point that won the game with a true placement boot that went over with plenty to spare.

Langhorne came back to score in the same second quarter. Schneider started it by putting Riverside in a hole with a punt from his own 35 to the 10. An off-side penalty shoved them back to the five, from where Kolongowski punted to his own 45. Schneider immediately passed to Righter but the play failed. On the next play Semarian Brown shook loose and caught Schneider's pass on the 15. Digging in, the fleet Negro back scampered the remaining distance to score, making the count 7-6.

Off on four placement attempts against Falls Township in their opening game, Langhorne stretched their unsuccessful string in this department to five as a pass play with Schneider tossing from a fake kick formation failed. As the game turned out, it cost the Redskins a tie.

The final two quarters developed into a hard, bruising fray on the part of both sides, with Riverside fighting to protect their lead and add another score for reasons of security, and Langhorne threatening often with their ever dangerous passing attack.

The Red and Blue line gained a host of admirers midway in the third session, even though they did fall before the battering tactics of Keihner several times. They showed their mettle by finally holding Riverside after the

winner's had made a first down on the five with goal to go. On the first play Keihner went to the one, on the second Lukens spilled him on the two and on the third the entire line broke through and made him fumble on the six, Schmidt recovering for Riverside. Desperate, Riverside sent Keihner back to try a field goal but the placement was blocked, Langhorne taking the bounding ball on their own 37.

Another drive in the fourth period took Riverside to the Langhorne 24, but again the line braced and the locals took possession. At this point Schneider broke loose on a 20 yard run to the 44, and on the next play he hit Bill Fizzano with a pass that was stopped on Riverside's 25. Three line smashes moved it to the 21, but at this juncture Armand Fizzano fumbled a lateral and Szimkunas recovered for the opposition on the 28. The game ended shortly thereafter, but not before to players had been banished for throwing punches and a Riverside tackle fell over from exhaustion. The affair was a miniature Zale-Graziano donnybrook during the last quarter. By Gill

Rams Victorious Over Langhorne In Close Game, 7-6

Riverside High School will be seeking its third straight win when they play host to Morrisville, Pa. Morrisville will be the second Pennsylvania school to play at Riverside. Kick-off will be at 8:00 p.m.

Morrisville and Riverside did not play last year, although they are not strangers to each other. The last time they met, Morrisville easily downed the Maroon and Whites but visitors have not been doing very well. Last Saturday they were held to scoreless by East Greenville.

Riverside's Coach Wistert, back from the west coast, will be on hand to run the team from the bench. Al has been working on a pass defense all week.

A weak pass defense almost cost the Rams a victory last Saturday night. It was only the poor receivers of the visiting team, that kept them from running up a big score. Inky Schneider, one of the best passers seen on the local grid-iron for years, gave the fans many a scare as he shot the ball into his team mates hands. Only to see them drop pass after pass.

Big Ken Keihner, Riverside's 210 pound fullback, has proved that he is fully recovered from injuries received early in the season. Big Ken who should be one of the best fullbacks in South Jersey, led his team mates to a hard earned victory over Langhorne 7 to 6.

Langhorne gave the Rams a harder fight than was expected. The visitors had a passing attack that was difficult to stop.

Both teams pushed over their scores in the second period, Riverside had Keihner's toe to prove the point that gave them the victory.

The locals got their score on a 33 yard march down field. The big feature of the drive was a long pass. Tom Kolongowski to Ben Worthington. This one play was good for 50 yards and put the Rams on the losers 22 yard mark. Keihner hit the line for 8 yards on two plays. Emil Schmidt got first down on the ten. Kolongowski picked up 2. Keihner scored on an 8 yard off tackle run, carrying two men over the goal line.

Keihner added the extra point with a perfect placement. This point was later to be the margin of victory.

Langhorne came back after several exchange of punts. With the ball on the Maroon and Whites 45 yard line. Ben Brown came into the game for only one play. This was enough as, Inky Schneider took the ball and passed to Brown, who took the ball over his shoulder to score standing up. The losers attempted a pass for the extra point, that failed.

Riverside had two other fine chances to score. The winners had the ball on the 7 yard line, as the half ended. Keihner took the kick-off, after the touchdowns from

the 10 yard line to the 10. Party B's picked up 20 yards on two plays. Kolongowski threw two passes to Bal and Schmidt, carrying the pigskin to the visitors 10 yard line. Keihner moved the ball to the 7, as the half ended.

Riverside came back strong in the second half. After Langhorne failed to gain on the kick-off, Kolongowski ran the punt back to the 39. Wistert's boys moved on up the field, right on up to the 1 yard line. Losing 5 yards Keihner attempted a field goal from the 6. The ball was blocked, ending the scoring threat.

The Maroon and Whites had a big lead in first downs 14 to 9. Langhorne scored most of their first downs on passes, as Riverside's forwards held their running attack to a standstill.
