

# REDSKINS WIN ON END RUN BY "DOC" RIGHTER

**Bensalem Loses Turkey Day  
Battle by Score of  
7 to 0**

## FIELD WET AND SOGGY

**Backfield Men Had A Hard  
Time Because of The  
Bad Footing**

LANGHORNE, Nov. 23—A right end run of eight yards for a touchdown by "Doc" Righter gave the Langhorne Redskins a 7-0 victory over the Bensalem Owls yesterday morning in the traditional Turkey Day classic between the two Lower Bucks County schools.

Viewed by a large crowd, the game was played despite the soggy and muddy field which made playing very difficult. On many occasions, backfield men were stopped because they could not get a footing to start their runs. At the close of the tilt, all of the players were covered with mud from their helmets down to their football cleats.

However, the wet field and ball did not prevent the two kickers, "Inky" Schneider and "Ed" Turner from getting off some nice boots during the game. And neither did it hinder the passing attack of the Langhorne team which gained considerable ground via the passing game.

The Bensalem team was handicapped from the start when it was learned that their star half-back, Jack Hansen, was prevented from playing because of illness. On top of that, two more of its regular starting line-up had also taken ill, Dapp, the left end, and Bristow, who plays tackle.

But the Owls put up a gallant fight and although the playing was mostly in their territory, they were a threatening eleven. The team played with a die-hard spirit and although several were injured during the fray, they refused to leave the game, knowing their coach lacked substitutes.

In the first quarter of the game, the Langhorne team scored a touchdown on a pass but the play was recalled because one of the Redskins was off-sides. Bensalem took possession of the ball on a fumble, following this.

The second quarter saw the Langhorne team score the touchdown that netted it the triumph. Schneider got off a beautiful kick which Abe ran back to the 25 but a Bensalem player was detected clipping from the rear and the Owls went back to their 10. After a line play was futile, Kaleda attempted a pass which was intercepted by the Langhorne Kaleda on his 30 yard line. Schneider and Lukens made short gains in the line but Fallon found an opening at the right side and when nailed was on the Bensalem 15-yard mark.

A pass, Righter to Hibbert, put the ball on the 7 yard line and Lukens gained two more on a line charge. The Bensalem team was off-sides on the next play and penalized 2½ yards from their goal line. Lukens attempted a sweeping end run but was nailed by Fareno and Laster back to the eight yard line. Righter tried to toss a pass to Schneider but it was blocked by Kaleda. On a lateral, Lukens to Righter, the Langhorne fullback, crossed the goal line. Schneider scored the extra point on a line buck, making the score 7-0.

The Owls started a drive of their own immediately after the touchdown and added by a 15-yard penalty and a 15-yard end run by Turner carried the ball to the Langhorne 35 as the half came to a close.

The Hansenless Bensalem team continued its strong offense in the third quarter and threw a scare into the Langhorne rooters. Schneider and Turner both got off good punts and following an exchange, Bensalem received the ball on their 40. Laster broke loose on an off tackle slice and made 15 yards to the Langhorne 40. Laster carried the pigskin on two more plays to make it first down on the Langhorne 29. On the next play, Bob Kaleda ripped off eight more yards to reach the Langhorne 21, but the play was recalled because of an off-sides penalty. The Owls' attack was then halted.

The remainder of the period saw Langhorne still fighting to get out of its territory which was not accomplished until the start of the fourth period when Schneider got off on a 15-yard end run to reach the Bensalem 48. Before the game was over, "Inky" Schneider had intercepted two more Bensalem passes and just before the tilt ended, Righter had tossed a 10-yard pass to Fallon who was stopped three yards from the goal. It was the third time in the quarter that Righter had rifled a completed pass to Fallon.

The game ended a four-game winning streak by the Bensalemites who won four and lost six games during the season. The Redskins finished their season with four wins and a like number of defeats.

Between halves, the Bugle Corps of the Jesse Soby Post, American Legion, paraded and drilled.
