

Neshaminy's Single Wing Attack Rips Chester, 39-0, for 22nd

LANGHORNE. — The night was nippy but Neshaminy High School, a perfect host, made things quite warm for the Chester Clippers here Friday night.

The Redskins' potent single wing attack rolled up and down the high plains of Langhorne as it maltreated the Clippers by a 39-0 score. It was the second convincing defeat for Chester in the young season. The Orange and Black lost their opener to Altoona, 33-0.

The small Chester eleven was game to the final whistle, but it required something more to deal with the big, fast and tough Neshaminy aggregation as the Skins racked up their 22nd consecutive success.

Chester held the winners on the first set of downs, but those who thought the Clippers might be eyeing an upset were quickly straightened out.

John Rothrock returned Dick Kind's punt to the Chester 34-yard line. Ed Kaminski, the most impressive of a half dozen hand running Neshaminy backs, picked up three around right end. Wing back Bob Baxter took a reverse and bulled close to the 18-yard stripe. Two plays later Kaminski smacked up the middle for Neshaminy's first TD.

An out-of-bounds punt by Kind deep in Chester's territory gave Neshaminy the ball moments later on the Clippers' 37. The Redskins wasted no time taking advantage of the break.

Barr made four yards and then Kaminski, getting good blocking and moving like an armored car, circled his right side for 32 yards and a score.

Chester made one of its better advances on the next series. Bob by Armstrong floated a pass good for 28 yards to move the ball to midfield early in the third quarter. The running attack, ineffective for most of the night, stalled at this point and Kind punted to Neshaminy's 24.

The Indians came back fast.

Kaminski got 15 and Bob Baxter picked up nine. Kaminski went back to pass, was almost trapped for a big loss, and ran it out for 16 more yards.

Baxter then broke lose to the Chester 17. Bruce Evans charged

to the six and Kaminski took two plays to hit paydirt. The point was missed and the score remained 19-0 at the intermission.

Neshaminy picked up 143 yards on the ground in the first half to minus 12 for Chester.

Norristown Kenrick Posts 17th in Row

Norristown's Bishop Kenrick and Beaver Falls, two of Pennsylvania's top scholastic football powers in 1960, stormed to easy victories Friday night, serving early notice that once again they will have to be reckoned with.

Bishop Kenrick posted its second triumph of the season and its 17th in a row, whipping a scrappy Reading Central Catholic eleven 18-0.

The victory pushed Bishop Kenrick into a deadlock with Clifton

Heights as the teams looking the second longest winning streaks in the state.

Wyomissing, which kicks off its season tonight against Schwenksville, has 21 victories.

Clifton Heights doesn't open its season until the end of this month. Beaver Falls, which powered its way to a 9-0 record and the WPIAL-Class AA title last year, upended its first conference foe, Sharon, 12-0. The defending champs opened the season last week with a 27-14 triumph over Beaver County rival New Brighton.

In one of the biggest upsets of the night, Hazleton handed Berwick its second straight loss, wallowing the Bulldogs 31-0. Berwick had won three titles last year, including the championship of the sprawling East Penn Conference.

In another significant conference contest, Chief Logan downed Darkhorse State College 34-12, to grab off an early lead in the race for the West Penn championship.

And the big game in the South-Central Pennsylvania area found Chambersburg downing Hanover 41-6 in a nonconference clash.

In other important contests: Lack Haven whipped Hald Eagle Area, 47-7, Lewistown squeaked by Bloomsburg 34-12. Altoona dumped Windler 32-25 and Pottstown edged Norristown 6-0.

Cocher Tony. Cain brought his forces out of the locker room with renewed vigor. Some hard tackling and a personal foul penalty against the home team slowed the Redskins' attack somewhat, but Kaminski surprised the Clippers with a fourth down rattle dazzle pass play to Bob Baxter which covered 42 yards for a touchdown.

At this point, Neshaminy sensed victory and the reserves began to see action. Dick Ciccone, a hard running second line back, scored the final two touchdowns on short plunges.

Chester's strongest attack was mounted late in the third period. With little Eddie Minka doing most of the groundwork, the Clippers moved from their own 40 to the Neshaminy nine. A 15-yard pass interference penalty aided the march.

The locals had a third down and four situation on the Neshaminy 9. The winners brought their first string line back into action and the burly Redskins tacklers promptly threw quarterback Armstrong for a nine-yard loss to halt the march.

Chester's ground attack showed very little production for the night and that was mostly Minka's mark. The 132-pound boy seemed to pick up steam as the game wore on.
